

# The Patriots

*Turn of the century popular culture has seen a resurgence in reflection and nostalgia for where we came from and what made us who we are as a nation. Tom Hanks in "Saving Private Ryan", Tom Brokaw's "The Greatest Generation" and now Mel Gibson in "The Patriot". There have always been Americans that were prepared to give everything they had for the cause of freedom. But no one group of citizens has ever given as much or risked so dear what our founding fathers did. This is an excerpt from a speech by Mr. Rush H. Limbaugh, Jr., father of the famed radio talk show host. His words chronical events surrounding the most courageous individuals in early American history. It is placed here as a testament to the men and their families whose sacrifice gave birth to the freedom that each of us lives every day of our lives as Americans.*

What kind of men were the 56 signers who adopted the Declaration of Independence and who, by their signing, committed an act of treason against the Crown? To each of you the names Franklin, Adams, Hancock, and Jefferson are almost as familiar as household words. Most of us, however, know nothing of the other signers. Who were they? What happened to them?

Eighteen were under 40; three were in their 20s. Of the 56, almost half—24—were judges and lawyers. Eleven were merchants, 9 were land-owners and farmers, and the remaining 12 were doctors, ministers, and politicians.

With only a few exceptions, such as Samuel Adams of Massachusetts, these were men of substantial property. All but two had families. The vast majority were men of education and standing in their communities. They had economic security as few men had in the 18th century.

Each had more to lose from revolution than he had to gain by it. John Hancock, one of the richest men in America, already had a price of 500 pounds on his head. He signed in enormous letter so "that his Majesty could now read his name without glasses and could now double the reward." Ben Franklin wryly noted: "Indeed we must all hang together, otherwise we shall most assuredly hang separately."

These men knew what they risked. The penalty for treason was death by hanging. And remember: a great British fleet was already at anchor in New York Harbor.

They were sober men. There were no dreamy-eyed intellectuals or draft card burners here. They were far from hot-eyed fanatics, yammering for an explosion. They simply asked for the status quo. It was change they resisted. It was equality with the mother country they desired. It was taxation with representation they sought. They were all conservatives, yet they rebelled.

It was principle, not property, that had brought these men to Philadelphia. Two of them became presidents of the United States. Seven of them became state governors. One died in office as vice president of the United States. Several would go on to be U.S. Senators.

Though the resolution was formally adopted July 4, it was not until July 8 that two of the states authorized their delegates to sign, and it was not until August 2

that the signers met at Philadelphia to actually put their names to the Declaration. Even before the list was published, the British marked down every member of Congress suspected of having put his name to treason. All of them became the objects of vicious manhunts. Some were taken. Some, like Jefferson, had narrow escapes. All who had property or families near British strongholds suffered.

Francis Lewis, New York delegate, saw his home plundered and his estates, in what is now Harlem, completely destroyed by British soldiers. Mrs. Lewis was captured and treated with great brutality. Though she was later exchanged for two British prisoners through the efforts of Congress, she died from the effects of her abuse.

William Floyd, another New York delegate, was able to escape with his wife and children across Long Island Sound to Connecticut, where they lived as refugees without income for seven years. When they came home, they found a devastated ruin.

Phillips Livingstone had all his great holdings in New York confiscated and his family driven out of their home. Livingstone died in 1778 still working in Congress for the cause.

Louis Morris, the fourth New York delegate, saw all his timber, crops, and livestock taken. For seven years he was barred from his home and family.

John Hart of Trenton, New Jersey, risked his life to return home to see his dying wife. Hessian soldiers rode after him, and he escaped in the woods. While his wife lay on her deathbed, the soldiers ruined his farm and wrecked his homestead. Hart, 65, slept in caves and woods as he was hunted across the countryside. When at long last, emaciated by hardship, he was able to sneak home, he found his wife had already been buried, and his 13 children taken away. He never saw them again. He died a broken man in 1779, without ever finding his family.

Dr. John Witherspoon, signer, was president of the College of New Jersey, later called Princeton. The British occupied the town of Princeton, and billeted troops in the college. They trampled and burned the finest college library in the country.

Judge Richard Stockton, another New Jersey delegate signer, had rushed back to his estate in an effort to evacuate his wife and children. The family found refuge with friends, but a sympathizer betrayed them. Judge Stockton was pulled from bed in the night and brutally beaten by the arresting soldiers. Thrown into a common jail, he was deliberately starved to near death. Congress finally arranged for Stockton's parole, but his health was ruined. The judge was released as an invalid, when he could no longer harm the British cause. He returned home to find his estate looted and did not live to see the triumph of the revolution. His family was forced to live off charity.

Robert Morris, merchant prince of Philadelphia, delegate and signer, met Washington's appeals and pleas for money year after year. He made and raised arms and provisions which made it possible for Washington to cross the Delaware at Trenton. In the process he lost 150 ships at sea, bleeding his own fortune and credit almost dry.

George Clymer, Pennsylvania signer, escaped with his family from their home, but their property was completely destroyed by the British in the Germantown and Brandywine campaigns.

Dr. Benjamin Rush, also from Pennsylvania, was forced to flee to Maryland. As a heroic surgeon with the army, Rush had several narrow escapes.

John Morton, a Tory in his views previous to the debate, lived in a strongly loyalist area of Pennsylvania. When he came out for independence, most of his neighbors and even some of his relatives ostracized him. He was a sensitive and troubled man, and many believed this action killed him. When he died in 1777, his last words to his tormentors were: "Tell them that they will live to see the hour when they shall acknowledge it [the signing] to have been the most glorious service that I rendered to my country."

William Ellery, Rhode Island delegate, saw his property and home burned to the ground.

Thomas Lynch, Jr., South Carolina delegate, had his health broken from privation and exposures while serving as a company commander in the military. His doctors ordered him to seek a cure in the West Indies and on the voyage, he and his young bride were drowned at sea.

Edward Rutledge, Arthur Middleton, and Thomas Heyward, Jr., the other three South Carolina signers, were taken by the British in the siege of Charleston. They were carried as prisoners of war to St. Augustine, Florida, where they were singled out for indignities against the crown. They were exchanged at the end of the war, the British in the meantime having completely devastated their large land holdings and estates.

Thomas Nelson, signer of Virginia, was at the front in command of the Virginia military forces. With British General Charles Cornwallis in Yorktown, fire from 70 heavy American guns began to destroy Yorktown piece by piece. Lord Cornwallis and his staff moved their headquarters into Nelson's palatial home. While American cannonballs were making a shambles of the town, the house of Governor Nelson remained untouched. Nelson turned in rage to the American gunners and asked, "Why do you spare my home?" They replied, "Sir, out of respect to you." Nelson cried, "Give me the cannon!" and fired on his magnificent home himself, smashing it to bits. But Nelson's sacrifice was not quite over. He had raised \$2 million for the Revolutionary cause by pledging his own estates. When the loans came due, a newer peacetime Congress refused to honor them, and Nelson's property was forfeited. He was never reimbursed. He died, impoverished, a few years later at the age of 50.

Of those 56 who signed the Declaration of Independence, nine died of wounds or hardships during the war. Five were captured and imprisoned, in each case with brutal treatment. Several lost wives, sons or entire families. One lost his 13 children. Two wives were brutally treated. All were at one time or another the victims of manhunts and driven from their homes. Twelve signers had their homes completely burned. Seventeen lost everything they owned. Yet not one defected or went back on his pledged word. Their honor, and the nation they sacrificed so much to create, is still intact.

And, finally, there is the New Jersey signer, Abraham Clark. He gave two sons to the officer corps in the Revolutionary Army. They were captured and sent to the infamous British prison hulk afloat in New York harbor known as the hell ship "Jersey," where 11,000 American captives

were to die. The younger Clarks were treated with a special brutality because of their father. One was put in solitary and given no food. With the end almost in sight, with the war almost won, no one could have blamed Abraham Clark for acceding to the British request when they offered him his sons' lives if he would recant and come out for the King and parliament. The utter despair in this man's heart, the anguish in his very soul, must reach out to each one of us down through 200 years with his answer: "No."

The 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence proved by their every deed that they made no idle boast when they composed the most magnificent curtain line in history. "And for the support of this Declaration with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor."

**A team follows as a leader leads. Without exceptional leadership there would be no exalted walk to the stage to claim that 6'6" trophy to the deafening cheers of your instructors, corps of cadets, and parents. The 2000 National High School Drill Team Championships revealed three remarkable programs that produced three outstanding drill teams led by three phenomenal cadet commanders. In their own words, some insight into their views on the Nationals and what it takes to walk a mile in their boots.**

**SNI: What is your impression of competing at the Nationals?**

**Moad:** I had a lot of anticipation to come back (this year) and win again (as returning National Champs). My team was the best that I've ever seen them. Every event was spectacular. The Nationals takes diligence and intense preparation. We don't expect anything less than perfection.

**Pitts:** The Nationals is one of the best run meets I've been to. The judges are never biased, which I have felt in other competitions. We came into the Nationals knowing we had what it took to win. We knew what our competition was, and we knew they were gunning for us.

**Amschler:** Nationals competition was certainly challenging. Everyone there has the same goal. Enterprise, Springfield, Seneca ... they are all very good and we're all doing the best we can. You have to do it together as a team.

**SNI: What is your practice schedule when you are preparing for Nationals?**

**Moad:** We have a strong 2-week build-up before Nationals - 3 hours every afternoon. We do uniform inspections and practice all phases of the competition.

**Pitts:** Color Guard practices an hour in the mornings and Drill Team practices 2 hours in the afternoons, as well as many weekends.


**Amschler:** We practice three hours a day (split between mornings and afternoons) and several weekends.

**SNI: What is your hardest event? Why?**

**Moad:** Regulation is hardest because you can't put your own style into it. You have to do it by the manual. And it takes constant practice.

**Pitts:** Inspection is the hardest - it's nerve-wracking. At other events you know what they can and can't ask you, but not at the Nationals. Preparing for that is tough. We nicknamed the Head Judge "The Bear." Winning first place in Inspection was incredible.

**Amschler:** We focus the most on Regulation, but Inspection is the hardest. We do a lot of preparation for it. We get recruiters to come in and inspect us, but the Major is more intimidating.

**SNI: What were your expectations during the Awards Ceremony?**

**Moad:** I was confident in my team - I felt we did better than the other teams, but you can't expect to win.

**Pitts:** I was really nervous. We're not as sure of ourselves (at the Nationals) as we are at other meets.

**Amschler:** We could feel that we had it. But I was worried about Platoon Exhibition - we had some small errors there.

**SNI: To what do you attribute your success?**

**Moad:** Major. He's the reason we're here and has made Black Watch a way of life.

**Pitts:** Hard work and dedication and three great instructors. We can't do it without them pushing us. CDR is a great motivator - a great speaker; he's very inspiring.

**Amschler:** Master Gunny & Major. They set our goals and help us reach them. They give us the tools that we need to be the best.

**SNI: Closing Thoughts?**

**Moad:** This year had a difference in quality (from past years) - we didn't drop one weapon (in competition) all year long. I feel that with 10 returning cadets we will be just as strong next year. I am confident that we will win again.

**Pitts:** (Next year's cadets) have big shoes to fill, but they know what they have to do to get it done. I'm leaving behind a really strong team.





# National Capital Drill Classic

When you think of Washington, DC, images of monuments and museums come to life on a grand scale. This national landscape was a fitting backdrop for the pageantry and polish of the 9th annual **National Capital Drill Classic**. The DC National Guard Armory provides an impressive home for this heralded JROTC drill event.

The NCDC field of 48 Army JROTC drill teams made for a busy and spirited one-day competition. The "Parade of Colors" Opening Ceremony started the day off with a colorful flair. A brief inspirational speech by **Commanding General Stewart W. Wallace**, U.S. Army Cadet Command, added an element of drama to the early morning event kick-off.

Four team events in both the Armed and Unarmed Divisions comprise the NCDC team scoring. These events are: Unit Inspection, Platoon Regulation, Color Guard & Platoon Exhibition. A tight competition schedule makes organization and motivation an important recipe for ultimate success.

## Armed Division

A fiery rivalry has developed in Armed competition drill between Thomas Stone H.S. and T.C. Williams H.S. The 2000 NCDC was no exception as **T.C. Williams HS** from Alexandria, Virginia powered their way to the Armed Division Championship by just a single placement point! Led by **1SG LaGrant Smith**, the **Armageddon Red** drill team earned 1st place finishes in both Inspection & Regulation and a strong 2nd place finish in Color Guard, but a 6th place finish in Exhibition nearly cost them a title.

Finishing as the division runner-up, **Thomas Stone HS** from Waldorf, Maryland just missed in retaining their previous year division championship. The **Blue Cougars** drill team finished exactly one place behind T.C. Williams in each of the three basic events (Inspection, Regulation and Color Guard) and also gained a 4th place exhibition finish. Their solid finishes almost pulled them to the top and sets up a real showdown in 2001.

Repeating their 1999 finish as 3rd place overall, **Woodbridge Sr. HS** from Woodbridge, Virginia grabbed 3rd again. Displaying strength in all areas, Woodbridge featuring a stunning 1st place finish in Armed Exhibition drill.

The Armed Division was filled with other top performances highlighted by: **Liberty HS** (1st place Color Guard); **Fairmont Heights HS** (2nd place Exhibition); **Dunbar Sr. HS** (3rd place Exhibition) and **Lake Clifton/Eastern HS** (3rd place Regulation).

## Unarmed Division

Hitting on all cylinders, **T.C. Williams HS** blew away the competition in a runaway Unarmed Division Championship. The **Armageddon Blue** drill team repeated their 1998 & 1999 championships, winning every team event except Unarmed Exhibition where they grabbed a 2nd place finish.

Overall preparation and determination led **Thomas Walker HS** to a much improved finish at the 2000 NCDC. The **Pioneers** won the tie-breaker (more overall points) for the runner-up crown, paced by strong finishes in Color Guard (2nd place) and Regulation (3rd place).

Gaining 3rd place overall within the Unarmed Division was **Forestville HS** from Forestville, Maryland. The hard-nosed **Silver Knights** drill team finished well across the board, gaining a 1st place Exhibition, a 2nd

place Inspection, and a 3rd place Color Guard finish. Only an 8th place in Regulation performance cost them a clear runner-up title.

Other top finishes in the Unarmed Division included: **Thomas Stone HS** (three top 5 finishes); **West Potomac HS** (3rd place Inspection); **Howard HS** (2nd place Regulation, 5th place Inspection) and **Denbigh HS** (3rd place Exhibition, 4th place Regulation).

Knockout drills preceded the tense NCDC Awards Ceremony. Powerful closing words were delivered by **General Wallace** and the **Mayor's Trophy** was presented to the highest finishing JROTC unit in Washington, D.C. This trophy went to returning city champion, **Anacostia HS**.

The NCDC has grown and thrives under the tremendous support of **D.C. Armory Commanding General, Warren G. Freeman**. Without his efforts, the NCDC would not be presented in the first-class manner that has become the standard. Also, the judging corps from the **U.S. Army Old Guard** gave another fantastic effort for the cadets.

Sports Network would like to thank everyone who makes the NCDC the impressive event it has become. The dedicated schools throughout the 1st Region, 4th Brigade are already tightening their boot straps getting ready for the 10th annual NCDC scheduled for **Saturday, March 17th, 2001**.

When you think of demanding, all-around tests of well-rounded JROTC excellence, nothing compares to the two-day **Navy JROTC Nationals - Academic, Athletic and Drill Championships**. Frigid and snowy conditions couldn't put a damper on the tight-knit family of twenty-one Navy JROTC units from across the United States hot to compete at this historic event which has become affectionately known as simply the "Navy Nationals."

The event opened with the highly competitive **Athletic Competition** held on Friday afternoon. Jaws were dropping throughout the hall as both individual and team performances on display dazzled the crowd. With twenty-five points separating the top four athletic teams, a final push by **Green Run HS** captured the overall Athletic title. Paced by a blistering 03:12:57 time in the 16x100yd. shuttle relay, the powerful athletes from Virginia Beach, Virginia earned a tight win.

Finishing 2nd in Athletics was 1999 athletic overall champion **Oviedo HS** from Oviedo, Florida despite a first and second place finish in the two relay events, as well as a third place finish in the tight team push-ups competition.

Finishing in third place overall within Athletics (missing a championship by just 19 points out of 1,200) was **Alma HS**. Across-the-board strength and a strong 2nd place finish in Curl-ups put this program in contention right to the end.

Cadets then grabbed a quick bite of dinner and hustled over to the pressure-packed **Academic Exam**. Schools formed 15-cadet academic teams with each cadet taking a 100-question test on relevant Navy JROTC information. This provided a possible 1500-point team total. When the test scanner finally cooled off, **Flour Bluff HS** from Corpus Cristi, Texas blew away the field with a convincing 1,253 point total! This accomplishment was a true team effort, with a finish 70 points higher than the 2nd place unit.

In an amazing coincidence, **Nease HS** from St. Augustine, Florida grabbed second place in Academics (1183 pts.) by only a single point FOR THE SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR!

# Navy JROTC Nationals

In third place was **Lake Howell HS** with just one correct answer shy (1182 pts.) of a 2nd place finish. The team was led by individual top finishers Cadets Stange (1st-94pts.) and Williams (4th-92 pts.).

Cadets began the "uniformed" portion of the competition on Saturday morning. Brushes and mirrors were plentiful as **Unit Personnel Inspection** took center stage. This brutally stressful event (worth a staggering 1,500 points!) brought a 2000 repeat championship for **Flour Bluff HS**. Knowledge, discipline, and grit proved to be a lethal combination as these impressive cadets won handily in this must-win portion of the Navy Nationals (1323 pts.).

The Florida two-step was on display as **Boca Raton HS** (1231 pts.) and **Nease HS** (1179 pts.), distanced themselves from the competition field, earning second & third place respectively.

Along with Inspection, the crowd-pleasing **Drill Competition** was on display Saturday morning. Comprised of five team events totaling 1500 pts., drill is the backbone of this event and really shows off the discipline and hard work that makes these top units stand out.

**Flour Bluff HS** continued their dominance by grabbing the Overall Drill Championship. This powerhouse NJROTC unit won two of the five drill events (Unarmed Basic & Unarmed Exhibition) on their way to amassing a solid 1112 pt. total.

Thousands of practice hours helped **Boca Raton HS** grab the drill runner-up placement. Paced by a strong 2nd place Unarmed Exhibition Drill finish, the school edged past **McDowell HS** by just six points. No glaring weaknesses and an impressive Color Guard routine put this school in top drill contention.

Other outstanding drill performances included: **Lake Howell HS** (1st-Armed Basic, 2nd-Unarmed Basic); **Oviedo HS** (2nd-Color Guard, 3rd-Unarmed Exhibition); **Seguin HS** (1st-Armed Exhibition, 4th Armed Basic) and **South Kitsap HS** (2nd-Armed Exhibition).

The Knockout Drills preceded a fantastic Awards Ceremony, featuring **Rear Admiral Edward E. Hunter, Commander, Great Lakes R.T.C.** An inspirational speech was the perfect vehicle to capture the excitement of the 2000 Navy Nationals Awards Ceremony.

# 2001 NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

## Introduction

Sports Network International is pleased to provide this invitation to all precision drill units to attend the 19th annual **National High School Drill Team Championships** in Daytona Beach, Florida. This event is open to all high school JROTC units and select other military-style programs competing in Armed & Unarmed divisions. This is your school's **official invitation** to enter the nation's finest JROTC drill and ceremony competition, referred to worldwide as simply **"The Nationals."**

The **National High School Drill Team Championships** remain the most coveted drill destination in the nation. Schools travel from across the U.S. to attend this all-service drill spectacular. Schools considering entry into the **Nationals** *should make plans early* as competition spaces are limited to roughly **50 schools at the Masters Level; 50 schools at the Challenge Level; and 25 schools within the Open Level Color Guard event.**

Sports Network International, Inc. (SNI) serves as the Event Manager for the Nationals. The 2001 National High School Drill Team Championships are **proudly sponsored by the U.S. Army Cadet Command.**

## Competition Guidelines

All schools drill and are judged in accordance with their own service manual. In Armed Divisions where their manual is not specific, U.S. Army FM 22-5 (1986) is used. In the Unarmed Division, U.S. Air Force FM 36-2203 (1996) is used. The variety of services that have gained top finishes at Daytona is a testament to the fairness of this drill event. The event SOP is mailed to all registered schools in mid-January. Schools having questions regarding any rules & procedures in use for this drill meet should feel free to contact SNI before registering for the competition.

## Event Judging

All judges at the NHSDTC maintain a strong background in military drill. Judges are fully qualified military personnel representing all four branches of the service. All judges are given extensive judging manuals in advance of the event, as well as a full on-site briefing on the eve of the competition. The Nationals' judges are extremely motivated and give a 110% effort. This remains a major reason why so many teams look to end their drill season at **"The World's Most Famous Beach."**

## Competition Events

The NHSDTC maintains two competition levels. The **Challenge Level** is designed for drill teams who wish to be part of the Nationals experience while competing against similarly talented schools at a less intense skill level than the Masters Level. Challenge maintains Armed (demilitarized weapons only) & Unarmed divisions. Military Academies are no longer excluded from the Challenge level. Schools looking to enter "stand-alone" color guard units are also eligible to enter up to two units in the Open Level Color Guard event.

The **Masters Level** is designed to compete the finest drill programs in the nation together within three separate divisions. Teams utilizing standard demilitarized rifles compete in the **Demilitarized Arms Division**. Teams competing without weapons enter the **Unarmed Division**. The **Alternative Arms Division** is for teams using lightweight, facsimile weapons (regardless of their gender) AND teams that are all-female (regardless of the weapon type used).

- ★ Squad/Element Exhibition (8-11+ Cmdr.)
- ★ Platoon/Flight Exhibition (13 & over-no max)
- ★ Solo & Dual Exhibition

Schools may enter multiple complete teams in different divisions at the Nationals, **as long as no cadet competes for more than one team.** Therefore, schools entering both an armed and unarmed team may do so, but the two teams **must have separate cadets for each team.** This rule allows maximum cadet participation without adding multiple school entries utilizing the same cadets.

All Masters Level Armed units are allowed two entries (per team) in both Solo & Dual Exhibition events. Unarmed Masters units can enter two pairs in Unarmed Dual Exhibition. Also, **ALL CADETS** are urged to compete in their level's Armed & Unarmed Knockout Drills.

## NHSDTC Event Specifics

The National High School Drill Team Championships are held at the impressive **Ocean Center Civic Arena** in Daytona Beach, Florida in late Spring every year. This state-of-the-art facility features permanent seating for over 6,000 with outstanding amenities for a drill competition the size and prestige of the Nationals. The Ocean Center also features a complete concession area and plentiful bus & car parking. All cadets and instructors who attend the Nationals will attest that the Ocean Center remains the most exceptional drill & ceremony facility currently in use in the United States.

Schools are housed in Daytona Beach at one of 22 oceanfront hotels located within 10 minutes of the Ocean Center Arena. They provide quality & affordable billeting for every Nationals team. SNI will also offer select schools the ability to choose an Upgrade Hotel Package Plan at one of several select hotels. The Headquarters for the event is the **Adam's Mark Resort**. If you are sure you wish to attend, waiting could be very disappointing for all! Schools who register after the December 8th review deadline will have only a small chance of getting into the Nationals. The event is expected to be full on December 8th, with only standby slots available after this date.

## Additional Registration Info

Schools accepted for entry will be mailed confirmations on Monday, December 11th. Any school not accepted into the NHSDTC will have their Registration Entry Fee refunded within 10 business days from the review deadline.

All checks and written correspondence should be directed to **Sports Network International** at the address and telephone number listed below. Schools may contact SNI by e-mail for non-official items only. All essential correspondence should be done only by phone or regular mail.

## Armed Division

A talented attack in all events made for a tough team to beat as the **Crossed Rifles** Army drill team from **Lancaster HS** literally thrashed the Armed Division competition grabbing the overall championship. The well-disciplined group from **Lancaster, Texas** gained a top six finish in all four team events, as well as a powerful first place finish in the always-tough Inspection event. This well balanced drill attack made for a versatile, talent-laden combination that was simply unstoppable.

The Armed Runner-up title was hard fought. The **Teufel Brigade** Marine Corps unit from **Topeka HS** scratched their way to an Armed Runner-up title. The hard workers from **Topeka, Kansas** beat the competition by a single placement point! This team has improved their overall finish every year they have attended the Nationals. This "can-do" attitude put them over the top in capturing the Armed runner-up crown.

Other outstanding Armed Division performances included: **Grove City HS** (3rd Overall, 3rd-Inspection, 4th-Color Guard); **Winnsboro HS** (4th Overall, 2nd-Color Guard, 5th-Inspection); **Friendly HS** (1st-Regulation, 5th Exhibition); **Woodlawn HS** (1st-Exhibition); and **Clarksville HS** (1st-Color Guard, 2nd Regulation).

## Unarmed Division

This division maintained the tightest finish in the history of the Nationals. Just a few points on a few score sheets meant the difference between 1st through 5th place overall! **Newburgh Free Academy** from **Newburgh, New York**

had just enough gas to grab the Unarmed Division Championship. Just missing the top spot was the 1999 Armed Division championship school from **Laredo, Texas**. The hard-charging Marines from **United South HS** put together another solid effort, however a 10th place finish in Color Guard competition cost them a chance at an overall title. The **South Lady Panthers** showed the fight and spirit that makes them a formidable challenge in any competition they enter!

The Unarmed Division was FILLED with top performances, featuring: **Hialeah HS** (3rd Overall, 3rd-Regulation, 4th-Color Guard); **Gulfport HS** (4th Overall, 3rd-Exhibition); **Winnsboro HS** (5th Overall, 1st-Inspection, 2nd-Regulation); **Bloomingdale HS** (1st-Exhibition); **Jardines De Ponce HS** (2nd-Exhibition); **Pine Ridge HS** (2nd-Color Guard); **Eastside HS** (2nd-Inspection); and **Westover HS** (3rd-Color Guard).

A Masters Level competition field bursting with national drill talent provided the substance for the finest military drill competition in history. From the first event on Saturday morning to the last on Sunday afternoon, no prisoners were taken as every cadet gave everything they had — and then a little bit more in a quest for the National Championship of all-service military drill. Along with the fantastic drill competition, the cadets, instructors and parents were treated to clear skies, 80° weather, incredible, all-service judging and the always-impressive Ocean Center Arena. Highlights were as plentiful as seagulls as three different services took home Championships at the 2000 Nationals competition.

## Event Overview

The 2000 Masters Level competition at the Nationals was by any measure a huge success. So many top schools performing made the final results a true mystery until the awards were presented Sunday evening. With the inclusion of the **Challenge Level competition** and the **Open Level Color Guard event**, the Nationals have truly become a drill competition for ALL schools looking to be a part of drill excellence at any level.

## Demilitarized Arms Division Highlights

The toughest division at the Nationals brought forth the continued domination of perennial powerhouse **Winston Churchill HS** as the Demilitarized National Champion. While many schools put the pressure on this Army JROTC unit from drill mecca **San Antonio, Texas**, they were up to the test, earning three 1st place finishes (Inspection, Color Guard, & Platoon Ex.) and a 3rd place (Squad Ex.). The championship put the cherry on another flawless season for the **Black Watch** drill team, led by SAI, **Major Greg Mikesell**.

Finishing as National Runner-Up were the hard-charging devil dogs of **Fern Creek HS** from **Fern Creek, Kentucky**. The **Leathernecks** Marine Corps JROTC drill team put together a solid all-around performance displaying very few weaknesses. Their top placements were two, 2nd place finishes (Inspection, Color Guard) and a 4th place finish (Platoon Ex.).

This Navy JROTC drill unit from **Corpus Christi, Texas**, excelled earning two 1st place finishes (Inspection, Element Ex.) a 2nd (Color Guard) and two 3rd place finishes (Regulation, Flight Ex.). The championship went well with their Navy National Championship the school earned just a month before (see page 9) under the leadership of **CDR Armando Solis**.

After an unparalleled domination of the Unarmed Division (**8 championships in the past 9 years**), **Theodore Roosevelt HS** from **San Antonio, Texas** just missed a recapture of their crown. The **Riderettes** drill team was awesome, grabbing two 1st place finishes (Color Guard, Flight Ex.), a 2nd place (Regulation) and a 3rd place (Element Ex.), but a 9th place finish within the always brutal Inspection competition hurt their chances of repeating in 2000. All those who know this team expect them to be back in 2001 with renewed fire and purpose.

Other impressive teams included: **Winston Churchill HS** (2nd-Element Ex., 3rd-Inspection, 4th-Flight Ex.); **Hialeah HS** (4th-Regulation, Color Guard, Element Ex.); **Douglas MacArthur HS** (2nd-Flight Ex.); **T.C. Williams HS** (1st-Regulation); **Lyman HS** (2nd-Inspection, 3rd-Color Guard) and **Pine Ridge HS** (4th place overall, no team event lower than 8th place).

## Alternative Arms Division Highlights

This division has become up for grabs annually, with a new champion each of the last 5 years. 2000 was no different with the Marine Corps powerhouse **Fern Creek HS** from **Fern Creek, Kentucky** drilling their way to a convincing National Championship victory in Alternative Arms. The **Lady Leathernecks** drill team showed well-rounded strength, earning two 1st place finishes (Regulation, Squad Ex.) a 2nd (Inspection), a 3rd (Platoon Ex.) and a 4th (Color Guard). Led by the twin towers - **Major Allen Broussard and MGySgt. Doug Dunlapp** - these consummate competitors have a solid shot to drive this team to a return visit with the title at the 2001 Nationals.

Long-time Nationals attendee and past National Champion **Enterprise HS** just missed the coveted overall title. The dynamic **Belles of the Blue Knights** Army drill team maintained two 1st place finishes (Inspection, Platoon Ex.) and two 3rd place finishes (Regulation, Squad Ex.), with only a tough 9th place finish in Color Guard keeping them from the top spot. The strong finish by these well-disciplined cadets should sound the alarm that "the Belles are back" and hungry for a title.

Other inspired team finishes in this division were: **Lyman HS** (2nd-Regulation & Color Guard, 4th-Inspection); **Springfield HS** (2nd-Squad Ex., 5th-Platoon Ex.); **Clarksville HS** (3rd-Color Guard, 4th-Regulation, 5th-Inspection).




