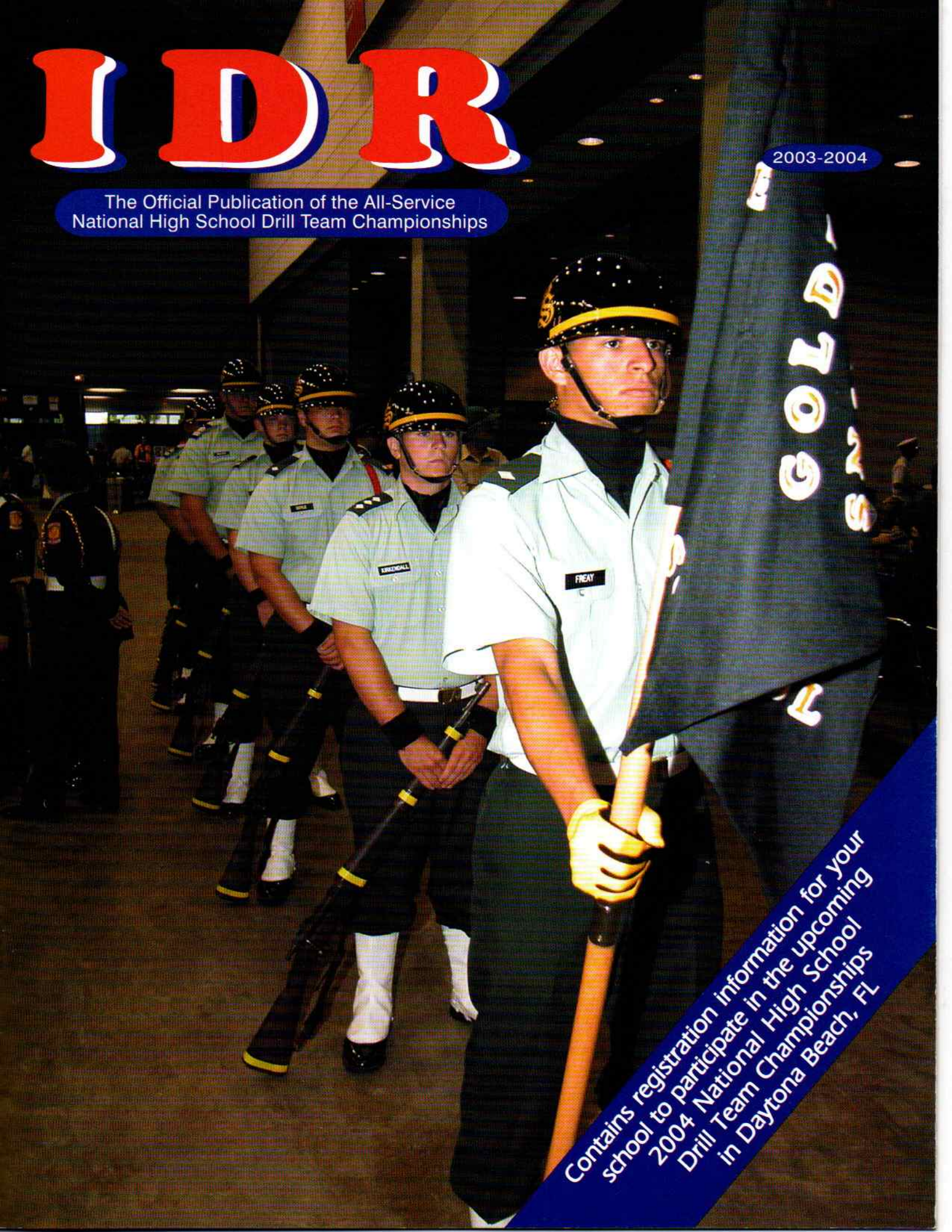


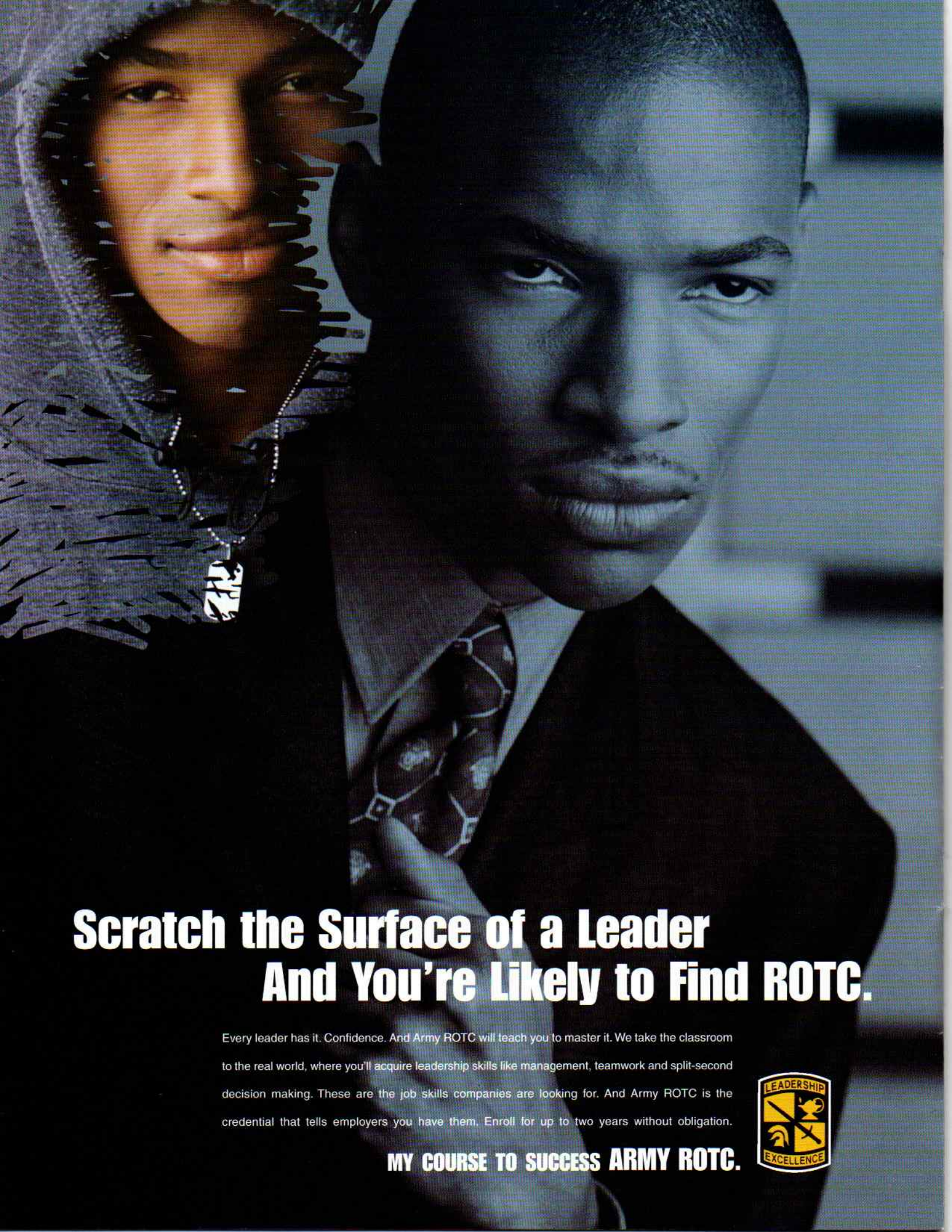

Navy Nationals Brings Excellence Onboard

On the shores of the Gulf of Mexico with the Blue Angels practicing excellence above, the **2003 NJROTC Nationals** cadets put forth excellence below, giving the spectators another nail-biting, seat-squirming affair! No other JROTC competition provides a more thorough test of unit talent than the two-day **NJROTC Nationals - Academic, Athletic & Drill Championships**. In all facets of the competition, Navy pride was on the line as cadets gave a 110% effort in the attempt to bring home the Navy Championship.

The event opens with Navy Chiefs giving every competing cadet the once-over in Unit Personnel Inspection (UPI). Summer Blues were sparkling as cadets fought back nerves while interacting with the tough judges. When the scores were tallied, **Flour Bluff HS** from **Corpus Christi, Texas** took home the victory. The multi-year NJROTC National Champions eased to victory with cool confidence, gaining 1,346 points out of a possible 1,500 total points. **Boca Raton HS** from **Boca Raton, Florida** earned 1,333 points in grabbing 2nd place, while **McDowell HS** from **Marion, North Carolina** surprised the field with a very strong 3rd place finish (1,317 points).

The event then moved outside to overcast skies for the arduous athletic competition. Once again, **Lake Howell HS's** powerhouse unit from **Winter Park, Florida** stole the show, earning 934 out of a possible 1,000 points. Strength across the board gave these hard workers their victory. Just missing in 2nd place was **Princess Anne HS** of **Virginia Beach, Virginia**. Great team scores got them close, with only a soft male push-ups score costing these cadets a chance at the Athletic victory. Grabbing 3rd place were the flyers from **Valdosta HS** in **Valdosta, Georgia**! Looking like a high school track squad, these cadets nearly maxed out the Oval and Shuttle Relay scores as the skies cleared, the track dried, and the sun shown bright the rest of the weekend!

Teams hustled to the chow hall to grab dinner before returning for the pressure-filled Academic Exam. Schools formed 10-cadet academic teams, taking 100-question tests on

relevant NJROTC material. When the pencils hit the desks, three schools really set the standard. **Princess Anne HS** smoked the competition, nabbing first place by answering an amazing 900 out of 1,000 questions correctly! "PA" needed virtually every point as **Flour Bluff HS** gained a solid second place finish with 893 questions answered. In the academic mix every year, **Nease HS** from **St. Augustine, Florida** amassed 878 correct answers for third place, FAR outdistancing their nearest competitor by a staggering 81 points!

Cadets hit their racks for a few hours of sleep before jumping into the crowd-pleasing portion of the event, the drill competition. Comprised of five team events worth over one-third of the total national championship points, drill superiority remains the backbone of any quality unit, and three schools clearly excelled in this area.

Flour Bluff HS dominated the drill competition portion of the NJROTC Nationals. Capturing 1st place in four of the five team events, Flour Bluff's only missing piece of the puzzle was an uncharacteristic run of rifle drops with their armed exhibition team. **Lake Howell HS** kept the pressure up in gaining a solid 2nd place finish, while **Boca Raton HS** easily distanced their closest competitor for a 3rd place overall drill finish.

The red carpet was again rolled out for the event awards ceremony at the **National Museum of Naval Aviation** (www.naval-air.org). This historic facility on the grounds of NAS Pensacola remains an unparalleled presentation of Naval aviation history. The museum remains one of the largest and most beautiful air and space museums in the world.

The closing ceremony began with a brief welcome message by Museum President, **Vice Admiral John H. Fetterman (ret.)**. The ceremony was

then highlighted by a keynote speech from distinguished guest speaker **Rear Admiral Ann E. Rondeau, Commander, NTC**. Her captivating words and the standing ovation she received set the tone for a very special evening.

As the presentation of trophies proceeded, the handwriting appeared to be on the wall. By capturing the Overall Drill Championship, the Unit Personnel Inspection, and taking 2nd place in the Academic Exam, **Flour Bluff HS** cruised to a 7th consecutive NJROTC Nationals Championship. With a phenomenal score of 4,751 points, the victory left many to wonder what can defeat this immovable object? Grabbing the National Runner-up title was **Lake Howell HS** with a solid score of 4,537. Scoring for the 3rd, 4th and 5th place overall was very tight with **Boca Raton HS** (4,467) just surpassing **Princess Anne HS** (4,447) who barely nudged past **Nease HS** (4,436).

NAS Pensacola proved again to be an exceptional host, providing limitless logistical and personnel support. Many of the Navy's finest JROTC units are already gearing up for the 2004 event, scheduled to return to NAS Pensacola on **April 2nd-3rd**. Hats off to all of these NJROTC units for their hard work, dedication and pursuit of excellence!

September 11th Fallout: Will High School Travel Ever be the Same?

Parents and administrators wrestle with the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks and ask the question, "Do we allow our children to travel to out of school, county or state functions?" People think these are new issues. Society has changed in the quarter-century since I was in high school, but many of these same debates were just as heated in the late 1970's.

It was Spring, 1977. As an honors English student and middle school track team member, I made many trips by school bus. Much of my school travel involved our honors English instructor taking our class on a field trip every other Friday. These trips allowed our class to have unique hands-on experiences outside the classroom; exposing us to culture, government and the humanities to broaden our mostly blue-collar horizons. Looking back on it now, I believe it was the most impactful learning I ever experienced.

Living just 10 miles from the District of Columbia in suburban Maryland, we toured many Smithsonian buildings, the FBI, the White House and other amazing government facilities with overwhelming history - and only 15 minutes away by school bus.

It was in early March when I remember seeing a television spashed with news bulletins during our lunch break. Twelve heavily armed Muslim terrorists had taken over the B'nai B'rith Int'l building in Washington, DC with over 100 hostages inside. I quickly grabbed my notebook and realized that we were supposed to go to this very building in just over two weeks!

In the ensuing days, news of the 39-hour conflict unfolded. Hostages were beaten, tied up and threatened with their lives. All endured death threats and guns held to their heads. It was a horrifying ordeal that left people in the District of Columbia and surrounding states shaken. *How could something like this happen? Was D.C. safe for field trips?* Parents, teachers and students had some hard choices to make in the coming months. *Would the administration ban all field trips? Would they ban travel to the Nation's Capital?*

How similar this all sounds to the issues faced today -- and this is over 25 years ago! Everyone expected the School Board to cancel all trips. But fortunately for all of the Montgomery County Public School students, the decision was made that no ban on school travel in any form would be imposed. *What a difference just 25 years makes!*

The school did make some modifications to allow nervous parents to step in and act in a parental capacity, making the decision what activities were acceptable and which were not without academic penalty. Our class went to the B'nai B'rith building, less a few of my classmates, and had an educational experience that could not have been matched by reading a textbook or watching a television set.

Why was there such a different way of managing this issue 25 years ago? It is too easy to say that today we live in a more dangerous world. And that is not necessarily true. There have been hundreds if not thousands of threatening situations that have occurred throughout the United States in just my short lifetime. I believe there are other societal changes that have led to decisions like these being handled in a reactionary manner.

In 1977, school administrations understood what a profound and lasting effect off-campus learning experiences have on the hearts and minds of their youngsters, be it JROTC drill meets, athletics, band competitions or other club activities. They did not fear the outrageously litigious society that we now face every day. Parents were far more involved in the daily education of their kids -- looking at schools as partners in education, not ceding control "*in loco parentis*". Informing the parents of a situation and giving those who felt uncomfortable the ability to remove their children from the activity was the accepted practice of the day. In 2003, this is no longer enough.

Parents now pressure school administrators to **cancel** activities rather than just remove their own child. This makes it easier for the parent, never having to explain to little Johnny why his friends may be doing something that he cannot. Oftentimes, administrators cave to this influence and look reactionary. School boards or principals will cancel activities because it is easier to explain an "irrational overreaction" than to explain a "failure to act". People often look at inaction as uncaring and unfeeling when in reality, inaction may simply be a review of the matter and deciding that action is not warranted.

How many millions of school children have had activities cancelled in the wake of the September 11th tragedy? How many of these children have had hopes of once-in-a-lifetime experiences snuffed out by the mere possibility of terrorist activity at some unspecified time, place and manner? Risk is a part of life. Keeping kids from travel yields the illusion that they are safer at school. Ask the Columbine H.S. students if they were safer at school on April 20, 1999 when 13 students were gunned down and 21 were wounded.

To cancel or delay our dreams and desires without cause begs the question...until when? Would you never allow your child to experience the thrill and awe of a tour at the White House because it *might* be attacked someday? Those administrators who would look to restrict travel or otherwise curtail natural high school learning experiences off-campus need to carefully consider what type of world we are shaping for our future leaders. For how long will this ban last? A month? A year? A lifetime? Schools and parents must apply a level of rationale to this ongoing debate. Otherwise terrorists will claim a profound victory - exerting a stranglehold on our very freedom to live a normal life.

The greatest action we can take as Americans is to continue to stand up to the threat of terrorism and strive forward, unabated, pursuing those dreams we hold most dear. This is not a blind dogma, but in the absence of specific, targeted terror threats, life must go on; teaching our children that logic must triumph over irrational fear. Let us, as parents, step up to the plate and take back the responsibility to guide our children, making the choices we feel necessary to protect their safety and enrich their minds. When we abdicate this role to a school board, we are parenting by proxy. It is my hope that by taking a moment to reflect, all individuals charged with making these types of life-altering decisions, be it parents, instructors or school administrators, will use their knowledge, rational minds and experience to guide our children - not their emotions and fears.

LEAVE IT TO **SOUTHERN REGIONAL HS** FROM **MANAHAWKIN, NEW JERSEY** TO ABSOLUTELY DOMINATE THE FIELD WINNING THE UNARMED DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP HANDS DOWN. THE **BLUE KNIGHTS** DRILL TEAM POWERED THEIR WAY TO 1st PLACE IN INSPECTION, REGULATION AND COLOR GUARD. THIS LEFT THEM PLENTY OF BREATHING ROOM WHEN THEIR EXHIBITION TEAM TOOK THE FLOOR (THEY STILL GRABBED A 5th PLACE FINISH!) PREPARED AGAIN IN 2003 BY **MSgt. LEE MESSINA** (STILL THE WEBMASTER OF THE FINEST JROTC WEBSITE IN THE COUNTRY - www.srsd.org/jrotc), THE NATIONAL STRONGMEN FROM THE GARDEN STATE ARE STILL SEEKING A SERIOUS CHALLENGE TO THEIR AIR FORCE NATIONALS DOMINANCE IN 2004!

FINISHING IN A DISTANT UNARMED DIVISION NATIONAL RUNNER-UP POSITION IS THE ALWAYS TOUGH **SILVER EAGLES** DRILL TEAM FROM **SANDALWOOD HS** IN **JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA**. DISPLAYING GREAT BALANCE AND SOLID PREPARATION, THE FLORIDA UNIT FINISHED WITH THREE EVENT TROPHIES (3rd-Inspection, 3rd-Color Guard, 4th-Regulation).

BEATING OUT A VERY TIGHT PACK OF TEAMS FOR THIRD PLACE WAS **LACKEY HS** FROM **INDIAN HEAD, MARYLAND**. THE **LADIES OF DESTRUCTION** TROPHIED IN JUST ONE EVENT (2nd-Inspection) BUT WITH OTHER SOLID FINISHES JUST OUT OF TROPHY PLACEMENT, THE UNIT SQUEEKED BY TO CAPTURE THE 3rd PLACE FINISH.

OTHER TOP UNARMED DIVISION FINISHES INCLUDED: **OXON HILL HS** (1st-Exhibition, 2nd-Regulation); **HIALEAH HS** (2nd-Color Guard, 5th-Regulation); **TIFT COUNTY HS** (2nd-Exhibition); **SURRATTSVILLE HS** (3rd-Regulation, 5th-Inspection) AND **MIAMI EDISON HS** (3rd-Exhibition).

AS MANY OF YOU NOW ARE AWARE, AFOATS JROTC HAS STATED THEIR OFFICE NO LONGER WISHES TO BE LISTED AS AN EVENT SUPPORTER OF ANY DRILL COMPETITIONS. THEY HAVE ALSO REQUESTED TO HAVE THE TERMS "NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP" AND "AIR FORCE" REMOVED FROM THE TITLE OF ANY DRILL COMPETITIONS (INCLUDING THIS ONE). 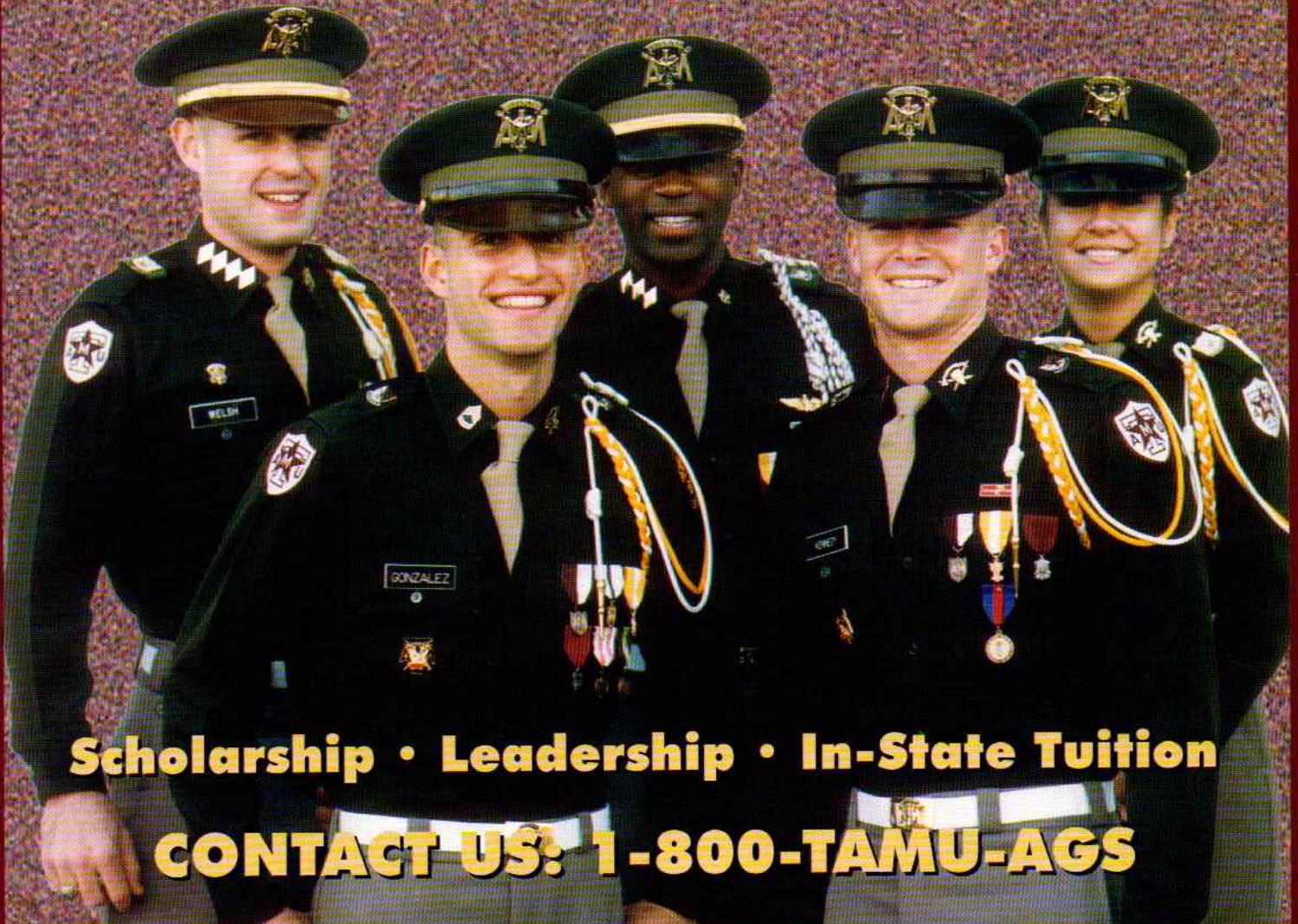

A Final Salute to the Capital Classic

The last year of the venerable National Capital Drill Classic competition showed the best and the brightest that Army JROTC units in the 1st Region, 4th Brigade had to offer.

The final year of the 1st Region, 4th Brigade Championship was a fitting sendoff for this innovative and historic competition. With 2004 bringing to the Nation's Capital the Army National JROTC Eastern Region Championship (see adjacent page), the 2003 NCDC was a fitting end to a fantastic decade-plus of Army Brigade Championship excellence in the greater Washington, DC area.

A heightened national threat level kept a few schools from attending, but over 700 Army JROTC cadets from Virginia, West Virginia, Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia were on-hand for an exciting day of competition drill. Cadets seemed to relish the ability to forget about the tensions in the world and display what months of practice and teamwork could yield in a first-class, indoor facility like the Prince George's Sports & Learning Complex.

ARMED DIVISION

One of the most overpowering displays of excellence in the history of the NCDC was put forth this year as long time top finisher and 2002 Runner-up **Liberty HS** from **Beaeton, Virginia** crushed the Brigade competition to capture the Overall Armed Division Title. The **Eagles** drill team brought home 1st place trophies in Inspection, Color Guard and Exhibition to power their way to the title. The tough cadets had their game on from the start taking the lead early in the day and never looking back!

Finishing as the Armed Division Runner-Up, **Thomas Stone HS** from **Waldorf, Maryland** put together their annual run at the title but came up just a bit short. The **Cougars Blue** trophied in all four team events (1st-Regulation, 3rd-Inspection/Color Guard, 5th-Exhibition) but needed a few higher placements in the eyes of the judges to challenge for the overall top spot. You can always be sure that Thomas Stone comes prepared to win and the 2003 unit that attended the NCDC did another exceptional job.

Many other schools within the Armed Division put forth very solid, noteworthy drill performances. These included last minute event addition **New York MA** (2nd-Inspection, 3rd-Regulation, 4th-Exhibition); **Forestville MA** (2nd-Color Guard, 3rd-Exhibition); **McDonough HS** (2nd-Regulation, 4th-Color Guard); **Fairmont Heights HS** (2nd-Exhibition, 4th-Inspection) and **Preston HS** (4th-Regulation).

UNARMED DIVISION

A very strong and evenly matched competition field butted heads with tight top scores in every event. When the sheets were coming in and being totaled throughout the day, it was obvious that Unarmed Division schools would have no idea who the overall champion would be until the champion's name was read at the Awards Ceremony as no single team trophied in every team event! This lack of knowing made for an electrically-charged awards ceremony with cadets literally sitting on the edge of their seats!

2002 Unarmed Champions **Forestville M.A.** from **Forestville, Maryland** had just enough in their tanks to take home another Unarmed Division Championship in 2003! Paced by a 1st place finish in Inspection, the **Silver Knights** drill team also gained a strong 2nd place in Exhibition and a 3rd place in Regulation to secure the victory. Forestville M.A. once again proved that they are a force to be reckoned with on the drill floor!

Just missing their bid for the Unarmed Division title, **St. John's College H.S.** from **Washington, DC** put together a tremendous effort in gaining the Overall Runner-up title. With a 2nd place finish in Inspection and two, 4th place finishes in Color Guard and Exhibition, the **McGovern Brothers** drill team just missed their chance. Knowing the leadership at St. John's, they will be back stronger than ever in 2004!

Other top finishes in the Unarmed Division included: **Howard HS** (1st-Color Guard); **Forest Park HS** (1st-Exhibition); **West Potomac HS** (1st-Regulation); **McDonough HS** (2nd-Regulation, 3rd-Color Guard); **Thomas Stone HS** (2nd-Color Guard) and **Parkdale HS** (3rd-Exhibition).

Multiple, exciting Knockout Drills were held while the team event scores were given their final double-check. This preceded a boisterous and cathartic NCDC Awards Ceremony. The towering presence of **BG Gratton O. Sealock, II**, Deputy Commanding General, U.S. Army Cadet Command delivered a wonderful message to the assembled mass that helped to set the tone for a special evening.

Sports Network International wishes to thank everyone who, over the years, has helped to give over 10,000 Army JROTC cadets special lifetime memories from competing at the National Capital Drill Classic. As the event moves to an Army Region Championship next year, we hope that the finest teams from the old NCDC competition will continue to enter and dazzle the crowd within the new 2004 Army JROTC National Drill Team Championships - Eastern Region.

Beginning in 2004, Army Junior ROTC units around the world will have the ability to compete within the first Army JROTC-only National Championship drill competition! Introduction

This event is open to all Junior ROTC units and select other military-style programs competing in Armed & Unarmed divisions. The **National High School Drill Team Championships** remains the most coveted drill destination in the nation. Schools travel from across the U.S. to attend this all-service drill spectacular. Competition Guidelines

All schools drill and are judged in accordance with their own service manual. In Armed Divisions where their manual is not specific, U.S. Army FM 22-5 (1986) is used. In the Unarmed Division, U.S. Air Force FM 36-2203 (1996) is used. The variety of services that have gained top finishes at Daytona is a testament to the fairness of this drill event. The event SOP is mailed to all registered schools in mid-January and posted on the website. Schools having questions regarding the event should contact SNI before registering for the competition.

Event Judging

All judges at the NHSDTC maintain a strong background in military drill. Judges are fully qualified military personnel representing all four branches of the service. All judges are given extensive judging manuals in advance of the event, as well as a full on-site briefing on the eve of the competition. The Nationals' judges are extremely motivated and give a 110% effort. This remains a major reason why so many teams look to end their drill season at **"The World's Most Famous Beach."**

Competition Events

The NHSDTC maintains two competition levels. The **Challenge Level** is designed for drill teams who wish to be part of the Nationals experience while competing against similarly talented schools at a less intense skill level than the Masters Level. The Challenge Level maintains Armed (demilitarized weapons only) & Unarmed divisions. Military Academies are no longer excluded from the Challenge level. All schools are also encouraged to consider entering "stand-alone" Color Guards into the exciting Open Level Color Guard competition also held on Friday.

The **Masters Level** brings the finest drill programs in the nation together to compete within three separate divisions. Schools may enter multiple complete teams in different divisions at the Nationals as long as no cadet competes for more than one team. Therefore, schools entering both an armed and unarmed team may do so, but the two teams must have separate cadets for each team. This rule allows maximum cadet participation without adding multiple school entries utilizing the same cadets.

All Masters Level Armed units are allowed two entries (per team) in both Solo & Dual Exhibition. Unarmed Masters units can enter two pairs in Unarmed Dual Exhibition. Also, ALL CADETS are urged to compete in their level's Armed & Unarmed Knockout Drills **NOTE:** no "knockout fee" is charged to participate.

NHSDTC Event Specifics

The National High School Drill Team Championships are held at the impressive **Ocean Center Civic Arena** in Daytona Beach, Florida in late Spring every year. This state-of-the-art facility features permanent seating for over 6,000 with outstanding amenities for a drill competition the size and prestige of the Nationals. The Ocean Center also features a complete concession area and ample bus parking. All cadets and instructors who attend the Nationals will attest that the Ocean Center Complex remains the most exceptional drill & ceremony facility currently in use in the United States.

Schools are housed in Daytona Beach at one of 20+ oceanfront hotels located within 10 minutes of the Ocean Center Arena. They provide quality & affordable billeting for every Nationals team. The event will be full on December 5th, with only a rarely used "standby slot" available after this date.

Schools accepted for entry will be mailed confirmations and listed on the SNI website by Monday, December 8th. Any school not accepted into the NHSDTC will have their Registration Entry Fee refunded within 10 business days from the review deadline.

Leathernecks Lead the Way in the NHSDTC Challenge Level competition

The Challenge Level competition at the 2003 Nationals was memorable for many reasons. But the one "in your face" fact was the overall dominance on display by the United States Marine Corps JROTC units. With just over 200 total JROTC units worldwide, a staggeringly high percentage of these schools attend the NHSDTC (14 schools this year!) and took home a massive number of team trophies. As the talent in this division has skyrocketed in the past several years, the number of eye-popping drill displays continue to soar, blowing away a few of the long-time judges who remember the Challenge Level as a home primarily for brand new programs with "green" drill units. Those days are gone as over 45 top-quality units annually vie in both the Armed & Unarmed Divisions to bring home a Challenge Level National Title.

ARMED DIVISION

The Armed Division competition was a re-enactment of Iwo Jima, as the Marines stormed the Awards Ceremony, capturing the top four placements. Leading the way was first-time Nationals attendee **Jesuit High School** from New Orleans, Louisiana. The **Blue Jays** drill team cruised to a Challenge Level National Championship with amazing consistency. The hard-chargers gained top 10 finishes in all four events, highlighted by 3rd place finishes in both Color Guard and Exhibition competition. The giddy excitement at the Awards Ceremony was a stark contrast to the tough game faces they wore during the event. These ground pounders could be back making noise in the Masters Level in 2004 and beyond!

The fight for second and third place probably continued all the way home on the bus, as **Clearwater High School Lady Tornadoes** grabbed the Challenge Level National Runner-up title, just edging out their 3rd place finishers and male counterparts, the **Tornadoes**. While both of these Clearwater, Florida teams garnered top ten event placements, the hard-nosed female cadets had just enough to edge out their cadet brothers. It must be noted that the Lady Tornadoes are the first all-female armed drill team to take home any Overall Award Title in the Challenge Level Competition. Great Job Ladies!

The Armed Division had many exciting finishes, including: **Abraham Clark HS** (1st-Regulation, 3rd-Inspection); **Northeast HS** (1st-Exhibition, 2nd-Regulation); **Wichita HS South** (2nd-Color Guard); **Col. White HS** (1st-Color Guard, 5th-Regulation); **Lynn English HS** (1st-Inspection) and **Gulfport HS** (2nd-Inspection).

New Jersey. Their preparation and intensity was unrivaled, garnering a 1st place in Inspection, and 2nd place finishes in Color Guard and Regulation.

The Navy JROTC unit at **Havelock HS** from Havelock, North Carolina gave it quite a run, winning three trophies, including a 1st place in Regulation. This excellent overall finish secured the Challenge Level

The **Ronald Reagan HS Diamondbacks** from drill mecca San Antonio, Texas captured the Team Exhibition event. This win put them into a solid position, gaining enough quality points to capture a 3rd place overall finish in the Unarmed Challenge Level event.

OPEN LEVEL COLOR GUARD CHAMPIONSHIPS

In a word...WOW! Easily the largest, finest and most geographically diverse Open Level Color Guard field ever assembled put on a display that still has people talking! Forty-one color guard units from across the United States were accepted to attend and they competed with distinction in this color guard only competition.

This Army JROTC unit from Dallas, Texas excelled in winning their first OLCG title. Narrowly missing the title was the always-tough AFJROTC **Falcons** from **Coventry HS** in Coventry, Rhode Island. Grabbing 3rd place was the Army JROTC unit from just 70 miles down the road at **St. Cloud HS** in St. Cloud, Florida. Rounding out the trophy placements was the Army JROTC unit from **Trevor Browne HS** from Phoenix, Arizona (4th place) and the USMC unit from **Gloucester HS** in Gloucester, Massachusetts (5th place). North to Alaska, the Rush to Excellence is ON!

It's an early winter day, December of 2000. The phones ring and moments later, a voice calls out, "There's a school on the phone that wants to come to Nationals from Alaska!" And so began the involvement of one of the most amazing programs that has ever graced the drill floor at the National High School Drill Team Championships. While more talented schools annually attend, smaller schools attend, richer & poorer schools attend, we have never had a school with a bigger heart overcome more obstacles on their way to Daytona Beach -- becoming the only native people to ever capture a National Championship at the NHSDTC.

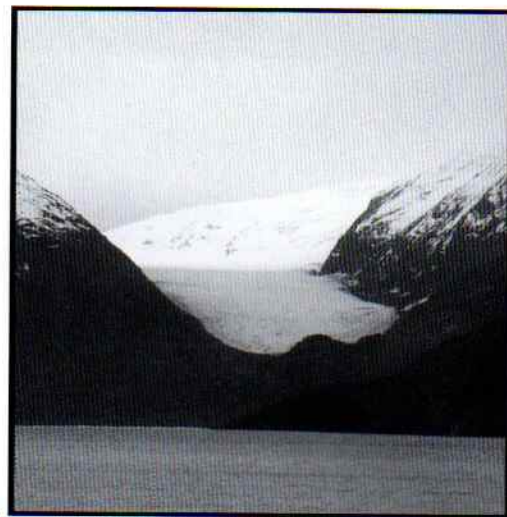
We should have seen it coming. In the months leading up to the 2001 Nationals, our office received several phone calls from the Bethel H.S. drill unit. The questions we field often indicate the type of team that is planning to attend. These were not lazy questions whose answers jump out of the S.O.P. at first glance. These were the "between-the-lines" questions that just the mere asking, often indicate a detailed preparation and a complete determination and dedication to win.

Sure enough, the Warriors from tiny Bethel, Alaska came in and stunned the competition field by earning a third place overall Challenge Level Unarmed Division finish in 2001. Undaunted, the Warriors returned in 2002 and captured the Challenge Level Unarmed Division National Championship. This year, moving up to the Masters Level competition, the Warriors drill team not only won the Unarmed Inspection competition, but left the exhibition drill floor with thousands of gaping onlookers after a performance that has as many differing descriptions as there were onlookers. The only consensus was, "It was amazing!"

When I contacted the unit immediately after the 2002 event to congratulate them on their championship finish, I was asked if I would be interested in guest speaking at their "Dining Out Ceremony" the unit hosts each December. I have served as Master of Ceremonies or Guest Speaker at many functions over the years but none mean more to me than the JROTC functions I have attended. After discussing such a trip with my wife, I accepted their gracious offer.

I assumed Bethel would be small, rural and cold. But my expectations were dwarfed by the remarkable spirit and charming attributes that make up the hard-working cadets who choose to be a part of the Army JROTC program in this small southwestern Alaskan town.

Packing light for my three-day trip, I began a 17-hour airline odyssey in Orlando at 7am, going through Salt Lake City, on to Anchorage, and then taking a 90-minute hop to Bethel, finally arriving at 7:30pm (12:30am Florida time!). No roads lead in or out of town with the only access being through air or water. I was met at the airport by what appeared to be half of the JROTC, and was overwhelmed by the genuine nature of the people and the outpouring of hospitality they gave to this "outsider".



After a great night sleep in my clean and comfortable cabin, I awoke at 0500 local time (internal clock still in need of adjustment!). God smiles on fools and small children as the outside temperature hovered around 32° (thankfully, as the normal winter temp is between -20° and 20°F with wind chills often delving into the -70°F range). It was dark outside and would stay so until about 10am. A brief four hours of dimmed daylight would yield to a 2pm twilight, then pitch dark again by 5pm. In the 15 minutes I was outside, not a single car was seen on the paved road that snakes through town. I could, however, hear the unmistakable sound of snowmobiles in the distance driving on the frozen river. Miles of flat, undisturbed plains and icy terrain in every direction gave way to tall, snowcapped mountains on the horizon, effecting an aura of isolation. The peacefulness and amazing natural beauty was so evident, yet I imagine it is easily dismissed by those who experience it every day.

I couldn't help wonder how a championship drill team practices with sub-zero temps and only four hours of pseudo-daylight!

As light began to creep into the sky, I walked the mile or so to Bethel Regional H.S. on the edge of the two lane paved road. The small, weathered, wooden homes that hugged the roadway were simple and exemplified the tough life so many of the locals endured. The town of Bethel is home to roughly 4,500 people and Bethel Regional H.S. maintains a total school population of around 400. The JROTC unit has roughly 65 cadets and therefore is a large percentage of the student body. Many of Bethel's residents are Yupik natives; indigenous Alaskans that have been on this land for centuries. The Yupik have a proud heritage that is honored by the JROTC unit, which incorporates elements of their native dance into their distinctive drill routines.

Throughout my trip to Bethel, I was the guest of SAI MAJ Carl Bailey and MSG Barbara Wright. The position these two leaders fill are vital in a populous of cadets often looking for adult role models. Major is the "face" of the program and MSG Wright is the "heart". Major Bailey is the self-effacing and self-titled "PR" department of the unit. His easy-going nature masks the well-deserved pride he takes in the accomplishments of his program.

Begun in the 1995-1996 school year, Bethel JROTC quickly rose to prominence. Not only through capturing several state exhibition drill championships, but through their community service work, and even more impressively, through their selection as a U.S. Army JROTC Honor Unit with Distinction for the 2002-2003 school year. But their greatest pride is mentoring and molding the cadets into productive citizens through the efforts of the program.

"Many people look down on our town. We have a high degree of drug usage, alcohol abuse, etc.," stated Bailey. "We have a lot of kids that like to stay here late into the evenings because they don't have a great home life. Some we almost kick out at night. We work with the kids and give them as many chances as it takes to keep them doing the right things and staying in the program."

As I walk the halls of the school with Major Bailey, I meet the school principal and many other administrators and educators. On the surface, Bethel High School is a modern campus with ample connections to the rest of the world through various media sources. Beyond outward appearances are the heartfelt smiles and genuine goodwill that lights up most every face I see, students and faculty alike. Their upbeat attitude is infectious.

While touring the JROTC program, Major Bailey takes a moment to point out the Bethel JROTC Wall of Fame. There are photos of past cadets who have gone on to great accomplishments. Academy appointments, active military service and other noteworthy items give these alumni special recognition -- encouraging even the newest freshman cadet to understand that greatness can lie ahead if you work for it!

When the bell rings we take the opportunity to visit the lunch room. It is a small area, with food served concession-like. Bailey explained that the school was losing a great deal of money running the cafeteria. So the Major offered to have his JROTC take over the lunch duties for the entire school! Not only did the school embrace the idea, they no longer lost money on the program AND the JROTC turns a tidy profit which helps to fund the significant cost of traveling to competitions throughout Alaska and to the Nationals.

Joining the cadets at lunch, I get the chance to ask them about the program. The kids have a genuine love for their program and their instructors. Their feedback is much like other units I have visited. "Master Sergeant is so hard on us! -- she expects us to be perfect." is the common theme. Not said with disdain, they are made with a smile that suggests the cadets understand that the tough exterior MSG Wright exudes is the outer shell of a love she maintains for every cadet who gives 100%.

After lunch, MSG Wright and I discuss the program as she gives me a quick tour of the town in a tough-looking pick-up truck that looks like it has survived many winters. "We have to work on the cadets all the time to look people in the eyes when they are speaking," stated Wright. "Also to speak up! These kids have it pretty tough but we accept no excuses. Some of these kids are ashamed of their heritage and try to do things to hide it. We have to drive it home to be proud of who they are and where they come from."

We pull up to a small non-descript National Guard building off-campus where the drill team practices. Visions of the dark boxing ring in the movie *Rocky* dance through my head. Upon exiting the truck and locking the passenger door, I get a smile from Wright, followed by, "No need to lock it -- where would anyone take the truck?" It's easy to forget that thirteen miles of paved roads in the entire town does not make for much of a getaway!

To see them practice is to see a transformation unlike anything I have ever witnessed. Somewhat quiet, soft-spoken cadets with typical teenage posture and mannerisms hear the SGM issue a command and BOOM! "Instant game face."

In the tropical warmth of Daytona Beach, the Bethel Warriors have made unique adjustments to fine-tune their experience at the Nationals. As the Judging Director, I rarely get to see daylight for several days, arriving at the Ocean Center at 0530 and leaving past 2200. Partly because of the intense daytime temperatures and partly because of the time zone change, on more than one occasion I have bumped into the Warrior drill team going to practice in the middle of pitch darkness

while every other team is sound asleep. SGM Wright's intensity never lets up as she drills and drills the cadets to ensure they will produce their best performance. Seeing the look of confusion on my face, Major Bailey gives me the answer, "We're nocturnal - we perform better in the dark!"

I wonder if either of these towering figures will really understand their lasting impact on the cadets and the community as a whole until they are gone. They have helped these rural youngsters do something they will remember for the

rest of their lives. The cadets have worked harder than they thought they could, to achieve success and notoriety many felt could never be attained. The lessons they learned along the way will carry forward for the rest of their lives, as well as through the lives of their children. Breaking the cycle of mediocrity starts with reaching out to those who strive for something better. And the Army JROTC at Bethel H.S. has made an impact that reaches far beyond the little town in southwest Alaska.

People were buzzing throughout the weekend at the level of excellence on display at the Masters Level. In a field surging with incredible depth of talent, three teams dominated to attain National Championship titles. The breathtaking precision and bold, exciting exhibition sequences have become trademarks of the Masters Level competition. Every school that competes at this level, regardless of their overall finish, deserves honor and respect. The year-round effort that is required to be accepted into the Masters Level competition at the Nationals is unparalleled in the world of competition drill. SNI would like to applaud all of the cadets who make the sacrifice to be the best they can be each year and put it on the line at the Nationals.

ALTERNATIVE ARMS DIVISION

Despite a hard-charge from many talented Florida JROTC programs, the well-trained ladies from **FERN CREEK HS** in **FERN CREEK, KENTUCKY** put together their fourth consecutive National Championship title. As they have done every year, the **Lady Leathernecks'** drill team garnered their strength through overall superiority, capturing two 1st place finishes and three other top four placements. Led by the retiring drill master **Major Allen Broussard** and drill wizard **MGySgt. Doug Dunlapp**, these Marines have set a high benchmark for excellence that has heretofore been unparalleled within the Alternative Arms Division at the Nationals.

Beating a tight pack of tough runner-up units, the Army JROTC unit from **Winter Springs HS** in **Winter Springs, Florida** grabbed 2nd place in both Inspection and Color Guard. These solid finishes helped the Golden Bears defeat the always-tough **Miami Coral Park HS Hurricanes Army JROTC** drill.

The Alternative Arms Division was filled with other exciting, noteworthy finishes including: **Deerfield Beach** (1st-Inspection); **Spring Valley** (1st-Squad Ex.); **Seneca** (1st-Regulation); **Palm Bay** (2nd-Regulation, 3rd-Color Guard) and **J.H. Reagan** (2nd-Squad & Platoon Ex.).

UNARMED DIVISION

The Unarmed competition started out tight but a single poor finish by their closest competitor left **Flour Bluff HS** alone at the top. The NJROTC unit from **Corpus Christi, Texas** destroyed the competition with five, 6th place or better finishes, including two 1st place trophies earned in Color Guard and Flight (Platoon) Exhibition. Led by CDR Armando Solis, HMCS **Lee Hollaway** and the retiring HMCM Bill Pettis, the **Sea Hawks** cleared room in the trophy case for a 2003 NJROTC National Championship as well as an all-service NNSDTC Championship!

Gaining strength every year they attend, the **Lady Devil Pups** from **Rahway HS** in **Rahway, New Jersey** powered to an impressive National Runner-up title. Only a tough 15th place finish in Color Guard kept these dynamos out of the picture for an overall National Championship. They needed every point as the **Riderettes** from **Theodore Roosevelt HS** were right behind in third place, paced by a strong 2nd place Element (Squad) Exhibition performance.

The Unarmed Division also produced: **John Jay** (1st-Element Ex.); **Marmion Admy.** (1st-Regulation); **Bethel Regional** (1st-Inspection); **Francis Lewis** (2nd-Flight Ex.); **Pine Ridge** (2nd-Color Guard); **John Marshall** (3rd-Flight Ex. & Inspection); **Sandalwood** (3rd-Color Guard) and **United South** (3rd-Regulation).

DEMILITARIZED ARMS DIVISION

Literally a half dozen schools were within shooting distance as the teams stepped onto the floor for the final competition Sunday morning. However, **Flour Bluff HS** showed they were the best of the best, capturing the Demilitarized Arms National Championship with a near flawless Platoon Exhibition sequence. The team was strong all year and performances in Daytona showed that overall strength, garnering a 1st place (Inspection) and two 2nd place (Regulation, Platoon Ex) finishes. The NJROTC **Sea Devils** pulled off the near impossible, gaining a double National Championships (Demilitarized Arms & Unarmed, only done by two other schools in the history of the Nationals!)



From judges, instructors, and spectators, the general overview was without question; the 2003 brought together the finest collection of high school JROTC drill talent ever assembled in one location.

The fight for the Runner-Up title was a squeaker! By a single quality point, **Black Watch** from **Winston Churchill HS** narrowly defeated the **Blue Guard** from **Douglas MacArthur HS**. Both teams grabbed 1st place finishes (Squad Ex. and Platoon Ex., respectively) to distance themselves from the rest of the pack.

Other top performances included: **John Jay** (1st-Regulation, 2nd Squad Ex.); **Francis Lewis** (1st-Color Guard, 3rd-Regulation); **Winter Springs** (2nd-Inspection); **Ronald Reagan** (2nd-Color Guard); **Fern Creek** (3rd-Inspection, Squad Ex.); **Rahway** (3rd-Color Guard) and **Enterprise HS** (3rd-Platoon Ex.).

The shirt art design MUST contain the name of the event, with the year and the location (all listed on the left column). **Other Items to Consider when creating your design:** The minimum design size is 8-1/2" x 11" with a maximum size of 13" x 17". - 4) Limit of ONE entry per person, per event (*FOUR total entries if you submit art for each SNI drill event*)
- 5) Artwork becomes the sole property of Sports Network International, Inc.
- 6) Sports Network International, Inc. reserves the right to edit artwork to our specifications. We may shrink or expand your work or edit elements to make the image work for our event needs.
- 7) Sports Network International, Inc. is not responsible for lost or misdirected mail, nor any other misfortune that could keep your design from getting into our hands.
- 8) Odds of winning totally depend on the number of eligible entries received and the subjective evaluation of the judges.
- 9) Winners will be notified by mail in advance of the event and will be posted on our website. A Savings Bond will be awarded either on-site during the competition the shirt was designed for, or after the competition if the cadet is not present.
