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Dynasties & New Blood Pave the Navy Way

Would any of the Navy's finest schools achieve the elusive goal of dethroning multi-year national champion **Flour Bluff High School** under the blue skies of Pensacola, Florida?

Every Spring, the best of the best from each Area in Navy JROTC travel far and wide to test their overall mettle in the arduous Navy JROTC Academic, Athletic & Drill Championships. The competition is always fierce and a genuine treat for competitors and spectators alike. These tenacious young squids converge annually on the home of the Blue Angels, NAS Pensacola, Florida to compete for the highly coveted title at the "Navy Nationals".

After the dynasty from Flour Bluff HS earned a razor-thin Championship in 2005, hope sprang eternal from many competitors that they could vanquish the New York Yankees of the drill world. But champions of this caliber have a heart and soul that will not allow them go quietly into that dark night. If someone was going to best Flour Bluff, they would have to take the crown away as this proud program was not going to give away anything.

The overall Navy Nationals competition is a totally unique experience in the world of high school athletic competitions through its variety and intensity. Much like active-duty military life can be, the event maintains "hours of waiting followed by minutes of terror!" A long 14-hour competition day kicks off the event on Friday beginning at 0700. Early school registration on Friday morning leads every competing cadet into the meticulous Unit Personnel Inspection (UPI) competition. Here, hard-boiled Navy Chiefs scour every competing cadet only to be followed immediately by Marine judges evaluating the Color Guard units. Both events' "by-the-book" nature and rigid uniformity give even the most casual onlooker a moment's pause to watch the excellence on display.

All competing units are so well trained and prepared that the UPI event is typically separated by a small margin; but when the pencils were still this year, two schools distanced themselves from the field. **Flour Bluff HS** from Corpus Christi, Texas pounded out a slim victory early in this high point value event, besting **Boca Raton HS** from Boca Raton, Florida. In 3rd place, always tough **Lake Howell HS** from Winter Park, Florida also made a very strong showing.

The Color Guard event yielded the first dark horse victor as long-time attendee **East Aurora HS** from East Aurora, Illinois stunned many onlookers with a flawless colors presentation, just edging out always well-prepared **Centennial HS** (2nd place) from Las Vegas, Nevada and **Boca Raton HS** who trophied again with a 3rd Place finish.

Trading Class "A" duds for matching shorts and t-shirts, schools began to really sweat under the melting Florida sun during the

inspiring athletic event competition. Crowds of on-lookers cheer on their favorites, hoping to give them a boost of one or two push-ups or curl-ups that can sometimes mean the difference between winning & losing. It was a blow-out of record proportions as **Pearl River Central HS** from **Carriere, Mississippi** obliterated the competition in team Curl-ups; **Centennial HS** had a convincing victory in team Push-ups; while **Union Grove** from **McDonough, Georgia** hit the daily double by narrowly sweeping both the Oval & Shuttle Relay sprint events.

When all of the athletic scores were tabulated, **Pearl River Central HS** used their overall dominance in Curls-ups to eclipse a hard-charging **Centenial HS** who came in 2nd within the Overall Athletics event. A tight 3rd place Overall Athletic finish by **Lake Howell HS** put the Sunshine State schools from Area Seven (including Boca Raton HS and Flanagan HS) in a tightly-knit striking position to challenge multi-year champion Flour Bluff going into the final Day One team event, the Academic Exam.

With darkness firmly set-in on an event day that began long ago for most of these competitors, the 15-cadet academic teams put on their thinking caps and went after the 1,500 points up for grabs. No worries about perfect scores being churned out this year on the brutal 2006 exam with the median score dropping roughly 20% from previous years.

With the Scantron still smoking, the test may have been tougher, but the results were similar to past years. **Flour Bluff HS** soundly won the event, setting up a solid overall point lead going into the drill event competitions on Saturday. **Pearl River Central HS** had one of their finest academic performances, narrowly capturing 2nd place over the fantastic team effort put together by **Stephen F. Austin HS** from **Sugar Land, Texas** (3rd place).

Cadets and spectators alike hit their racks for a few hours of sleep before marching into the exciting drill phase of the competition. With four events all occurring simultaneously, keeping track of all of the drill action can be a bit daunting!

Many drill finishes were noteworthy, but the highlight had to be first time attendee **Patuxent HS** from Lusby, Maryland capturing both the Armed

& Unarmed Basic competitions! **Flour Bluff HS** captured 1st place in the Armed Exhibition event (as well as earning 1st place in Drill Overall) and annually strong **Junipero Serra HS** stepped up to win the Unarmed Exhibition event, giving them a strong 2nd place overall drill finish.

The famous **National Museum of Naval Aviation** (www.naval-air.org) plays host each year to the closing evening awards presentation. The ceremony is a memorable night of honor for these deserving youngsters. The evening kicked off with an outstanding keynote speech from Navy Nationals special guest speaker **Rear Admiral Gary R. Jones, U.S. Navy Commander, NSTC/Navy Region Midwest**.

Since the scores are not distributed in advance, everyone attending had the edge-of-your-seat excitement that helps to make the evening special. While many different schools took home trophies, as the night progressed it became apparent that the reign of **Flour Bluff HS** was to continue for a 10th consecutive year. The legends from Corpus Christi, Texas powered to a convincing Navy Nationals Championship Title.

Grabbing the Navy National Runner-up title was **Boca Raton HS**. Their finish was made all the more amazing as a late-entry snafu gave them just two solid weeks to prepare for the event! Just behind in 3rd place was the always-formidable **Centennial HS**. The support of NAS Pensacola, the Marines, the Navy Chiefs, the OCS Recruits and everyone else on base help to make this a special weekend all around. CLARK) JOINED THE ALWAYS TOUGH COMPETITION FIELD FOR THE FIRST TIME TO MAKE THE 2006 ARMED DIVISION EVENT THE MOST COMPETITIVE FIELD IN THE HISTORY OF THE AIR FORCE NATIONALS COMPETITION! WOULD THE HIGH FLYERS FROM THE OCEAN STATE HAVE ENOUGH TO DEFEND THEIR TITLE...?

SPRING VALLEY HS FROM COLUMBIA, SOUTH CAROLINA GRABBED THE ATTENTION OF ONLOOKERS EARLY ON, CAPTURING THREE TROPHIES (1st-EXHIBITION, 3rd-INSPECTION, 5th-COLOR GUARD) IN THIS TOUGH DIVISION. HOWEVER, A POOR 11th PLACE FINISH IN REGULATION PUT THE VIKINGS DRILL TEAM OUT OF TOP CONTENTION.

THOMAS C. CLARK HS AND JOHN JAY HS BOTH CARRIED THE FLAG TO THE AIR FORCE NATIONALS FROM DRILL MECCA SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS. WITH A NATIONAL REPUTATION FOR DRILL EXCELLENCE, THEY WERE BOTH PRIMED AND READY AND DID NOT DISAPPOINT! THE CENTURION GUARD FROM THOMAS C. CLARK HS POWERED TO THE FRONT EARLY, GRABBING A 1st PLACE IN REGULATION AND A 2nd PLACE IN INSPECTION. HOWEVER, TWO 6th PLACE FINISHES IN COLOR GUARD AND EXHIBITION LEFT THE DOOR OPEN.

ALWAYS IMPRESSIVE JOHN JAY HS MADE THEIR TRIP FROM THE LONE STAR STATE COUNT, GRABBING A 1st PLACE COLOR GUARD AND A 2nd PLACE FINISH IN BOTH REGULATION AND EXHIBITION. OTHER SOLID ARMED DIVISION FINISHES INCLUDED: FRANKLIN K. LANE HS (3rd-COLOR GUARD, 4th-EXHIBITION, 5th-REGULATION); RIDGELAND HS (4th-INSPECTION AND COLOR GUARD); SHILOH HS (3rd-REGULATION) AND E.E. SMITH HS (5th-INSPECTION).

UNARMED DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS

BEING A PRIMARILY UNARMED SERVICE, THE UNARMED COMPETITION AT THE AIR FORCE NATIONALS IS ALWAYS AN INTENSE DOGFIGHT. THIS YEAR, NEW TALENTED TEAMS WERE ADDED TO AN ALREADY STRONG COMPETITION FIELD TO MAKE EXCITING PERFORMANCES AS EASY TO FIND AS A SIMPLE TURN OF THE HEAD! EVERY TEAM IN THE HUNT EACH HAD A SINGLE EVENT WHICH WOULD PROVE THEIR DOWNFALL, BUT WHICH COULD PREVAIL DESPITE THEIR ACHILLES' HEEL?

2003 & 2005 OVERALL UNARMED CHAMPION SOUTHERN REGIONAL HS FROM MANAHAWKIN, NEW JERSEY LOOKED TO RECAPTURE THEIR TITLE AND THEY WERE CERTAINLY IN THE MIX UNTIL THE END. THEIR COMPETITION STYLE REMAINED UNCHANGED AS THEY GENERALLY NAIL THE "BASIC" EVENTS AND THEN HANG ON IN EXHIBITION DRILL TO WIN. THE BLUE KNIGHTS DRILL TEAM GRABBED 1st PLACE FINISH IN INSPECTION, 2nd IN REGULATION AND 5th IN COLOR GUARD. HOWEVER, A 15th PLACE FINISH IN EXHIBITION WAS NOT ENOUGH TO REPEAT AS CHAMPIONS IN 2006, LEAVING THESE TOUGH CADETS WITH A SOLID BUT UNSPECTACULAR 23 PLACEMENT POINTS.

JOHN JAY HS COPIED THEIR STRONG ARMED DIVISION PERFORMANCE, TOUTING A 3rd PLACE EXHIBITION AND TWO 4th PLACE FINISHES IN INSPECTION & REGULATION. HOWEVER, AN UNEXPECTEDLY LOW 12th PLACE FINISH IN COLOR GUARD LEFT THE SNAP II DRILL TEAM TIED WITH SOUTHERN REGIONAL HS. THEIR RAW POINT TOTAL BROKE THE TIE, EARNING THEM THE 3rd PLACE OVERALL UNARMED FINISH.

LOCAL POWER HOUSTON COUNTY HS (PRONOUNCED "HOW-STUN") FROM WARNER ROBINS, GEORGIA STORMED THE FLOOR WITH GUSTO, GRABBING

THREE TROPHIES LED BY A 1st PLACE FINISH WITHIN EXHIBITION DRILL. SADLY, A DISMAL 14th PLACE FINISH IN REGULATION DRILL CLIPPED THEIR WINGS BUT COULDN'T DAMPEN THEIR LOFTY SPIRITS IN CAPTURING THE OVERALL UNARMED DIVISION RUNNER-UP TITLE BY A SINGLE PLACEMENT POINT OVER BOTH JOHN JAY AND SOUTHERN REGIONAL.

AFTER MANY YEARS OF BEING THE BRIDESMAID, SANDALWOOD HS FROM JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA PUT EVERYTHING TOGETHER WITH JUST THE RIGHT FORMULA TO CAPTURE THE 2006 UNARMED OVERALL CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE! THE SILVER EAGLES DRILL TEAM EARNED THREE TROPHIES (1st-COLOR GUARD, 2nd EXHIBITION, 5th-REGULATION) AND A SOFT 9th PLACE INSPECTION FINISH COULDN'T KEEP THESE DETERMINED CADETS OUT OF THE FINAL CHAMPIONS PHOTO. THEIR MARGIN OF VICTORY WAS CONVINCING IN THIS ALWAYS TIGHT COMPETITION.

U.S. ARMY CADET COMMAND

The Green Wave of Army Excellence swept into the U.S. Army Cadet Eastern Region Championships - Macon, Georgia

With a venue shift south to the Peach State for the first time ever, 49 Army Junior ROTC units from throughout the



The Eastern & Western Region events comprise the "Army Nationals" - the finest single day collection of Army JROTC drill & academic talent found anywhere!

Eastern Region descended on Macon, Georgia. Their mission was simple - to see whose brains (academics) and brawn (drill) could dominate in one special day to capture the Army's Eastern Region Championship.

Schools knew from the 2005 event that the New York duo of Xavier HS and Francis Lewis HS would be the front-runners that would require vanquishing to take home the tallest hardware. Would other schools be up to the task? Only a long day of spirited competition would decide.

on the drill floor throughout the day. This depth of talent left most onlookers to believe the issue would be decided deep into the event. However, in the rich history of the Eastern Region Championships, no one team had ever maintained such a dominating overall single school performance. **Francis Lewis HS** from **Fresh Meadows, New York** ended any doubt about their ability to return to dominance early on through jaw-dropping performances featuring 1st place Inspection and Color Guard finishes (note: one of the finest color guard presentations many had ever witnessed), as well as 1st place in the Academic Exam competition and a very strong 2nd place Platoon Exhibition finish.

Their dominion was so complete in capturing the Armed Division Overall title and the lead so insurmountable, the Regulation finish (a respectable 6th place) by the **Patriot Guard** drill team was virtually unneeded to capture their Championship!

A bunched pack of talented drillers congregated and clawed for the coveted Armed Division Runner-up title. When the rifles cooled down, **Winter Springs HS** from **Winter Springs, Florida** came out on top. With solid trophy finishes in Color Guard (2nd place), Platoon Exhibition (3rd place) and Inspection (5th place), the **Golden Bears** drill team fought back the tough challenge from 2005 Armed Champion **Xavier HS** from **New York, New York** (3rd place Armed Overall). With two 1st place finishes (Regulation & Platoon Exhibition), a disasterous 13th place finish in the Academic Exam and 11th place in Inspection kept these tough drillers only 2 quality points away from grabbing the Runner-up title.

Other schools in the Armed Division who had noteworthy results included: **McNair Academic HS** (2nd-Regulation & Academics, 3rd-Color Guard); **Carver HS** (2nd-Inspection, 4th-Regulation); and **Cranston HS East** (4th-Inspection, 5th-Regulation & Exhibition).

UNARMED DIVISION

Spirited displays of military drill excellence glorified the tradition-rich Army green uniform throughout the Unarmed Division competition. However, much like the Armed Division competition, the Unarmed division early on changed from a horse race to a one horse warm-up lap. **Francis Lewis HS** repeated their complete domination in 2005 to again crush the competition. The **Patriot Pride** drill team captured 1st in every competition event with the sole exception of a 3rd place finish in Color Guard. The last New York domination of this magnitude belongs to **LaSalle Military Academy** from Long Island, New York back in the mid-to-late 1980's at drill meets throughout the Eastern United States.

The battle for Division Runner-up was strong but the victory for **McNair Academic HS** from **Jersey City, New Jersey** was very convincing. Powering their way to 2nd place finishes in every team event except Regulation (6th place), the **Tanko-Woosas** drill team was clearly deserving of the Unarmed Division Runner-up title over 3rd place Overall Unarmed Division finisher **Carver HS**.

With so much dominance at the top of the leaderboard, **Long Island City HS** (3rd-Academics; 4th-Inspection and Exhibition); **Forestville MA** (2nd-Regulation, 3rd-Inspection, 5th-Exhibition); and **Huchinson Central Tech HS** (4th-Academics, 5th-Regulation) were the only other schools to gain strong trophy finishes.

Western Region Championships - College Station, Texas

With the omnipresent "Howdy" in the campus air of event host Texas A&M University, 33 Army JROTC units marked their drill calendar to migrate to the Lone Star State to compete at the event the cadets commonly call the "Western Nationals." With Texas being the continental U.S. home of national drill excellence, Army programs from Houston, San Antonio and other famous drill stops in Texas combine with many regionally strong drill programs to make the Western Army Regionals event the most talent laden drill competition held outside of the Daytona Beach all-service Nationals event.

ARMED DIVISION

With so much drill talent in this field, it was anyone's guess if 2005 Armed Champion **Ronald Reagan HS** from **San Antonio, Texas** would have enough talent and good fortune to repeat their victory.

As suspected, the competition began with no clear favorite. Literally 6-8 schools were deep in the hunt for the top spot half-way through the day. **Theodore Roosevelt HS** from **San Antonio, Texas** jumped out with a big early lead. The **San Juan Guard** drill team earned a 1st place within both Inspection and Color Guard competitions. However a disasterous 19th place finish in Exhibition drill poured cold water on their chances to capture the top spot, settling for a 3rd place Overall Armed finish.

As the day wore on, it became obvious the competition was going to lie between cross-town rivals. **Winston Churchill HS** also from **San Antonio, Texas** displayed the legendary strength that has earned their distinguished program several Armed Division National Championship titles in Daytona Beach. With three 2nd place finishes (Inspection, Regulation & Academics) the **Black Watch** drill team put forth a strong overall finish. Historically one of their strongest events (Exhibition) proved to be their downfall as miscues gave these proud warriors a 14th place finish, forcing a tough Armed Division Runner-up title.

The Overall Armed Division championship title was, in fact, earned again by 2005 champion **Ronald Reagan HS**, despite finishing no higher than 3rd place in any team event! The breadth of talent displayed by the **Rattler Guard** drill team gave them just enough points to eke out the impressive victory with trophy finishes in Inspection, Regulation & Color Guard (3rd place) and Exhibition (4th place). Many people whispered that **Ronald Reagan** was poised to challenge **Flour Bluff's** Churchill HS dominance at the Nationals in Daytona but that would have to wait until May of 2006 to be decided!

Other Armed Division performances of note included: **Douglas MacArthur HS** (5th-Reg, 4th Overall); **James Madison HS** (1st-Ex); **J.H. Reagan HS** (4th-Reg, 4th-CG, 5th-Ins); **Grant HS** (1st-Reg, 4th-Ins); **Central Catholic HS** (1st-Academics); **La Joya HS** (2nd-Ex); **Sam Houston HS** (3rd-Ex) and **Ozark HS** (3rd-Academics).

UNARMED DIVISION

18 schools competed for the Overall Unarmed Division title and it was apparent early the top spot would come down to a three-horse race between familiar foes. 2005 Unarmed Division event champion **Theodore Roosevelt HS** pushed to the front with a 1st place finish (Inspection) followed by a 2nd place finish (Regulation). But the placements in the remaining events did not fare as well and the **Riderettes** were left with the same solid 3rd place Overall finish their male counterparts earned.

Ronald Reagan HS charged out of the gate with both guns blazing, capturing two 1st place finishes (Regulation, Color Guard) as well as two, 2nd place finishes (Inspection, Academics). The **Diamondback** drillers earned an uncharacteristic 8th place finish in Exhibition, totaling an impressive 14 "placement points" score (*the determining factor on who wins where lower is better*). But would this amazing finish be enough to win the title?

For years, **Winston Churchill HS** made a living off of their overall consistency and never was it more apparent than at the 2006 Army Championships! With FIVE trophy finishes yet only ONE top finish (1st-Academics, 2nd-Color Guard, 3rd-Regulation and Exhibition and 4th-Inspection), the **Queen's Guard** drill team had, by a single point, knocked off the impressive Ronald Reagan performance to capture the Overall Unarmed Division title. It was one of the closest finishes in history at this always tight competition.

Other top finishes in the Unarmed Division were: **Douglas MacArthur HS** (2nd-Ex, 3rd-Ins, 4th Overall); **Robert E. Lee HS** (1st-Ex); **Alamo Heights HS** (3rd-CG, 5th-Ins, 5th-Academics); **Caddo Parish Magnet HS** (3rd-Academics); **James Madison HS** (4th Ex) and **La Joya HS** (4th-Reg, 5th-Ex).

Corbett provided a positive message to the assembled cadets, instructors and family members before the trophy distribution at the closing-night Awards Ceremony. Tension was everywhere as the top finishers were announced and featured before the audience.

The involvement of the U.S. Army 12th Brigade helped to organize and ensure that knowledgeable, motivated judges were on hand to give the cadets a fair evaluation throughout the day. Their efforts led the way to ensure a fantastic experience was had by all. Work has already begun on the 2007 event, which should be another fantastic showing of drill talent. Early emails show this event will be another blockbuster!

From Nationals to West Point – A Long Gray Line



Sunday evening, May 6th, 2001, saw Michael P. Moad, Cadet Commander of the legendary Black Watch drill team from Winston Churchill High School in San Antonio, Texas become the first recipient of the Jean Weil Memorial Scholarship. Presented before an audience of thousands of admiring cadets and adults, presenter Justin Gates, Vice President of Sports Network International pronounced that "in all my years at the Nationals I have never met a more amazing cadet. I only hope that if I ever have a son, he grows up to be like Mike." Moad competed on the 1999 championship team, and as the Black Watch Commander in 2000, he had led his team to a National Championship. Before the night was through on this last trip to Nationals, he would have led his team to the Runner-Up National Championship title. But it was his next step in life that would put to the test his years at Churchill. In his efforts to attend the United States Military Academy at West Point, Moad's academics fell just short. He was accepted into their Prep School and utilized that year to enrich his education and prepare for one of the most demanding universities in the world. This journey would be a long and arduous one, filled with remarkable highs and daunting lows, all designed to turn a plebe into a world-class Army officer. This journal highlights his steps along the way as well as some thoughts on the long road between Nationals and West Point.

Prep School & Beast Barracks Fall, 2001 through Summer, 2002

My experiences at West Point have been profound on my personal and professional development. From the first time I stepped onto the "Go Army" pad at the USMA's Prep School to present, I have been challenged by superiors, peers, and even subordinates. The test of my character and determination to be an officer was not until after Prep school. "Beast" or what some call Cadet Basic Training at West Point was the first time I had really experienced a significant challenge since the triumphant summer of my Black Watch try-outs. I was fortunate to have had experience with the military and JROTC prior to Beast, so I didn't struggle as much as others with being yelled at. It was difficult for those who never had the opportunity to live the life of a JROTC cadet. I did my best to keep a good attitude and a sense of humor through the haze of confusion and chaos of ninety or so upperclassmen yelling at the comparatively small thirty-eight of the fifty of us that made it through Beast from my platoon. But that was just the start of the challenge known as West Point.

Plebe Year – 2002-2003

The academic year brought new challenges, missions, and goals to the table. I felt I had completed something noble, but in actuality, Beast was just a mere six weeks of my forty-seven month adventure. I look back on all that I have accomplished at the Academy and I must admit that what I thought to be difficult in the beginning is hardly comparable to the stress and pressure of performing and excelling later on down the road. Plebe year academics seemed challenging; I would study five hours a night, but what really made plebe year tough was the constant preparation for the next formation, ensuring our room and personal appearance were always up to the standard, delivering upper class laundry, knowing the next three meals in advance at all times, and never being able to talk outside your room. I finished near the top of my class that year but not without hours of trial and error, sacrifice and teamwork.

Camp Buckner – Summer, 2003

I soon reported to West Point for Camp Buckner where I would develop myself again in the art of soldiering but this time with a finer tuning of the soldier rather than cadet theme. Buckner was a memorable experience. I got to fire live M1A1 Abrams tank rounds, 50 caliber rounds from the top of a Humvee, live, sleep, and train in the rain among other basic soldiering skills. It was a summer to remember because I made some of the best friends I have at West Point. It was a long summer, almost twice as long as Beast, and we were always on the go. Virtually night or day we were somewhere training on the different equipment the Army uses in battle. I carried the M240B machine gun, which is probably the heaviest weapon system an infantryman could carry, all summer long. This was a struggle after awhile as we worked our way from camp site to camp site and through the navigational paths that we were tasked to follow (if you find yourself at Buckner, I recommend volunteering for something a little lighter). This summer was one of the more physically and mentally challenging experiences I had ever been faced with. It was one of the first times I had ever stayed up for more than twenty-four hours continuously. Now that I look back on Buckner I am glad I had the opportunity to lay in the mud all night waiting for the "enemy" to come out from the

dark and attack us with training rounds (blanks). Overall, Buckner was an enjoyable experience that taught me about the military and people; I had the chance to get to know my classmates and find out what motivates them. This summer, however, was only the beginning of what I thought to be the end of the hardest year at West Point.

Yearling – 2003-2004

Yearling or "Yuk" year was, in my eyes, twice if not three times more challenging and demanding than Plebe year. The classes were more trying and most people expected a lot more out of you as a Yearling. We were all Team Leaders now so of course we were perfect in every sense! In truth, most people were not, but I took plebe year very seriously just as I had done with most other things in my life, so I was prepared to become a Team Leader. I was assigned two plebes at the start of the year – this was my first shot at West Point leadership. I was in charge of everything regarding these two men. I was directly responsible for their failures and successes and the upperclassmen made sure you understood this fact. I was lucky that my plebes did not need as much developing as a lot of other plebes. Academics were definitely the most challenging aspect of Yuk year. The classes were far more demanding: I was not expecting to have to study more than

I did Plebe year. This was disappointing because I studied for about six hours or more daily and spent the majority of each weekend not watching movies but studying and attempting to get ahead in my classes. The exams were challenging but hard work pays off in the end. I finished first and second semesters relatively high in my class rank but not just because of academic classes.

At West Point, cadets are graded in three areas: Academics, Military and Physical performance. In a given year you receive grades for each event you take. For instance, in the Physical performance category one could expect to receive grades for a physical fitness class, a combative or hand-to-hand combat class, an intramural or varsity sport, as well as from the required semester physical fitness test (APFT). Then for each of the three pillars, they are combined to form your overall ranking or grade point average. With all of the other stresses of Yuk year one must also focus on his or her physical maintenance, military knowledge, as well as the full academic load. This year was no joke.



Beast - Summer, 2004

I made it through the challenges and what seemed to be strategically-placed blockades that kept me from enjoying more of my time. I fought through all the emotions of being away from my family and found pleasure in succeeding at West Point. I look back now and wish that I could have Plebe and Yearling year back, for these two years were by far the easiest days that I have seen since I started my Cow year. I took on a new roll as a Cow or Junior. As a company First Sergeant, I was responsible for nearly everything that happens or fails to happen in the company. I was in charge of 155 New Cadets and about 30 Cadet Cadre who were also selected for the Beast detail during the summer. Together the Cadre and I would help shape, develop, and motivate each and every New Cadet in our company to meet and perform at our standard – the Corps' standard. I had never been more tired, worn-out, fed-up, angry, and challenged in my entire life. I was busy from 0400 in the morning to almost 0100 the next day. I slept only three to four hours a night because I had to ensure that things ran smoothly, were on time, and looked good from all angles. I spent early mornings getting my plan for the day's mission ready to go and the late nights preparing again for the next day. I was always busy. There were some days that I never sat down for 20 hours straight; this is hard to believe but you can in fact eat standing up. I did everything that summer out of the desire to lead, motivate, and train my New Cadets to the standard of the Corps of Cadets and someday the Army. I worked my butt off to ensure each of my Cadre members knew my expectations and I spent the rest of my time enforcing those standards to the best of my ability. In the end, my company - Alpha company, earned the Best Company of the Detail award as well as four out of the six other achievement awards the

eight Beast companies were competing for. We worked hard and pushed our New Cadets firmly in all endeavors, but it was all for them in the end. The New Cadets did great and were both a good and bad group of kids at the same time, but as much as I disliked the experience at the time it was the best leadership experience I have ever had.

Cow Year – 2004-2005

The summer was soon over, and I was selected to lead a company, this time my academic year company, A-3 Anacondas as the company First Sergeant – a highly competitive and respected position within the Corps. I was responsible for the cadet's class performance, their conduct, appearance, rooms, and everything else. In this capacity I really gained a lot personally and professionally. On a daily basis I had to work with my own classmates to ensure that the company's operations ran smoothly. This is difficult because it is often hard for a person who is both your classmate and your age to accept the fact that you are in charge of them and their military grade, and cadets are also renowned for becoming very apathetic. As the highest ranked Cow in the company it was my job to strike a workable balance in order to keep everyone from beating each other's faces in while preparing to become officers of character.

I never failed to have my best friends there next to me providing me with a "head check" from the work that we so easily got caught up in. We made it our doctrine to spend as much time away from the academy as possible. There was never a weekend that was not filled with some type of adventure; in-fact, now that I look back on my Cow year I recall taking trips to Jordan, the United Arab Emirates, Puerto Rico, near-by Montréal, and not to forget the highly recommended New York City. It goes without saying that

when you work hard, you certainly deserve to play hard. I think this was my saving grace. My first two years at the academy were spent basically behind closed doors. I was consumed by doing well, studying, working out, and focusing on why I came to West Point. Yet, the last two years my focus actually became more tuned on becoming an officer as I had intended all along. It was then that I learned how to really manage my time, my resources, and my energy. I became a semi-master at getting my work done on time without ever procrastinating in order to create more time to have fun. I looked at it this way, as much as West Point is not a real college, I had better enjoy it as much as it allowed me to, for within a short span of time I would be a platoon leader and that job affords little time to "party."

Syria & Germany - Summer, 2005

Firstie year started off on a great foot. I was selected, along with three other of my classmates, to take part in a ground-breaking language immersion program in Damascus, Syria. It was an opportunity of a lifetime for four Arabic majors. We left school the end of May on a trip to Damascus. While there we each lived with a Syrian family and studied four hours daily at the University of Damascus. It was an intensive Arabic program which helped us each improve our speaking, listening, and writing skills considerably. I was not only grateful for the opportunity to expand and learn Arabic, I was also happy for the opportunity to live amongst people of a different culture, heritage, quality of life, and even religion. I learned a lot about myself, the world, and history and religion. It was an eye-opening experience that I will cherish for the rest of my life. As an officer or even a civil leader we must be cultured, worldly, and diverse. Without this, the military or civilian

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
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leaders of our country would be missing a huge part of their development as professionals. As we have seen from history, it is practically impossible for a society or country to help another society (or sometimes its own diverse population), without being aware of cultural sensitivities, language customs and barriers. This is critical, and it now serves as a part of my foundation as a leader.

Soon after my time in Syria, I quickly made my way over to Stuttgart, Germany where I had the great privilege to work with soldiers from the 1st Battalion, 10th Special Forces Group. Of the two free summers West Point affords its cadets, they require us to join an active duty unit and work side-by-side with the soldiers there. During my five weeks in Germany, I learned as much as I possibly could about non-conventional warfare through the eyes of the Special Forces teams which fight every day battles and wars throughout the world. It was a unique experience, for these guys are highly trained, self-motivated, and driven to making the world better.

Firstie Year – 2005-2006

Once I arrived back at West Point as a Firstie I jumped right into another leadership position. I was the commander of my academic year company, which is only a semester position. I had a great time and learned a great deal about people, leading, planning, and balance. In this capacity I was the highest ranking cadet in the company, so I made the decisions. Of course there are green suitors, or regular army officers and NCOs, watching our every move, but they gave me and the other leaders just enough room to succeed or fail. In my opinion, we did well as a company and as a chain-of-command. We set goals, a vision, and a mission and after it was all said and done, we accomplished nearly every single goal we had set out to reach. We maintained a very professional command climate that promoted teamwork, camaraderie, achievement, and professional and personal officer development. I am proud of our efforts, and it was an honor to stand in front of 120 of my company mates and be the example for them to follow.

After my company command, I was afforded the opportunity to lead my company's Sandhurst team. This would be a great chance for me to put together a team of eight males and one female to participate in the annual Sandhurst competition. I chose this because it would allow me to work on my military training skills, I could get into great shape in preparation for the Infantry Officer Basic Course following graduation and it would allow me to fine-tune my leadership skills. In short, I have seen a number of leadership positions which have allowed me to develop certain military leadership skills and this, the Sandhurst team, would be my last opportunity before I began my career as an Infantry Lieutenant.

Reflections on the Journey

I can remember the first time I waited behind the arms room door in our armory at Winston Churchill High School. Standing still and silent as we waited for the command port arms. The lights were off and my heart was beating quickly. I felt like a superstar as I waited for the door to part and the lead man to take the first steps through the threshold. When it was my turn to exit the arms room I was astonished by the number of parents and fellow classmates that awaited us, to see our traditional departure to nationals or any other drill meet for that matter. I ran quickly, slapped the weapon hard, and sounded off with "Black" as one foot struck the ground and "Watch" as the other followed closely behind. We circled the bus and came to a halt before loading up. It

was loud and I remember an intense feeling of pride as I knew I was a part of something great.

I had the same feeling of pride and accomplishment following Beast in the Summer of 2004. I stood next to a formation of 157 new cadets at the United States Military Academy. Though my job description called for me to be stern, strict, firm and aggressive, I could not help but feel the same emotions for the new cadets as I stared into the eyes of the proud parents standing before us. I never really took the time to notice things like this until that year. I was always too busy or too caught up in the chaos of the moment to realize the importance of days like this. I was their company First Sergeant, which didn't mean much unless you did the job right.

The last five years have been an amazing time in my life. I have had the opportunity to meet people that I will ultimately live, fight, and die with for the rest of my life along with learning from an array of professors who are at the top of the educational chain. These things are important to me now. A few years back the same feelings did not exist for such concepts and notions. I was a "punk" as my dad would say. The only things I knew were what I was exposed to in the small ring of friends I had. I never wanted to learn much more about different cultures, academia, and the means to development. I was arrogant then, but I have changed. I know what I did then was great; I think most people would agree if they won two national championships in any sport. Things have changed however. I am a much different person than I was back then as the Black Watch Commander.

The Academy has helped me change incredibly. I think I have a lot more patience, expertise, confidence, and presence than I used to. These are qualities that leaders need to possess. They still need improvement but I have come along way since my days of rifle drill. I used to ignore other classmates because I thought I was better than them. I did not know any better then, but I do now. I have learned the essence of leadership. I have learned that taking responsibility and ownership for yourself and your actions is important. I have learned that personality is a good thing to have and it is ok to smile, sometimes. There is a list of traits that I have built on since my departure from high school, but I still think there is more that is important in life than learning about leadership. I think understanding, applying, and feeling the essence of leadership and how it works with different people is what is important.

I had the opportunity to judge the Eastern Regional Army Championships while at West Point, and I observed a fantastic group of highly motivated cadets. It was a fabulous experience to judge as these cadets marched proudly upon the floor that I had once dominated when I was a cadet. I realized something during that long day. I found that I was happy for these cadets who took on the challenge of participating in JROTC. While I would never admit it in high school, I wish I would have been as proud of what I was doing then just as these cadets were that day, win or lose. The feeling of inspiration that I gained from these dedicated cadets on that drill pad was similar to the feeling I had while watching family and friends enthralled at the sight of their overwhelmed new cadets during their oath ceremony.

As I reflect on what I accomplished in high school, I realize that what you do back then does not matter as much as what you do tomorrow. I have learned through the high and low points in my life to be grateful for the opportunities that I have had. I have learned about what is important in life for me and to cherish these things. My advice is to make the best of each day you have because soon enough, you

will wish you had that time back. I wish I could do it all over again. I would go back with the knowledge that I have now and do it all right, but that is not possible. I want to go back and lead the right way. I want to use the skills I have now to inspire, motivate, and instill a sense of camaraderie in the soldiers who stand before me.

I think I can do it; I think I can be that leader that I have always looked up to. At this point in my life, I am proud of what I have accomplished, but time goes by all too quickly nowadays. I been out of high school for years now, but the images of the drill floor at Nationals are still fresh in my mind. I can remember the intense sensation after hearing my team's name called for the championship title. Those were great moments in my life, but I have something better to look forward to in the future. That is being able to apply what I have learned throughout high school and college to where it counts. The business of being a war fighter, taking care of soldiers, and inspiring them to be the best that they can possibly be is what I have now.

So as I reflect back on the short years of my life, I am reminded of how important education, dedication, pride, teamwork, and dreams are, not so much what people think about me. I look now into the eyes of those who stand before me at West Point and I see the same thing. I see that the next generation wants to excel and fulfill the same dreams and aspirations that I have. I am proud of those who stand up for what is right, those who have integrity, honor, and respect instilled into their daily lives, as well as those who are willing to challenge themselves to be the leaders of tomorrow.

After five years of the West Point system, I can look back and actually see how this place changes a person. I can say without hesitation that I have developed and grown into a much more mature, confident, organized, and driven leader. I do not know everything or have the best solution for every problem. Yet what is most important is that as we grow as leaders we gain the ability to trust others who have the proper experience and then sit back and evaluate until we are one-hundred percent trained on the standard. I know that once I become a platoon leader I will not know every aspect of tactical operations and soldier care, but I do know that I will have the best foundation possible to be able to lead my troops with honor, integrity, and courage. I am positive that West Point has given me the tools to succeed.

Now, over nine years after I took my first steps into the armory at Winston Churchill High School I am prepared to take my first steps into the real world as a leader in our Army. I recall standing at attention in front of hundreds and sometimes thousands of spectators at a number of drill meets with such determination and drive to perform well. That chance presents itself once again. This time I will stand in front of the American public as I prepare to perform the duties my nation and its people calls upon me to do. I am proud of what I have become and I am privileged to serve in this honorable profession. With graduation approaching in a very short three months I can finally see the green grass on the other side of the hill, but I seem to think that when I get to the other side, that is after graduation, that I will probably see another hill that I will need to charge with spirit, enthusiasm, courage, charisma, and perhaps a little support.

On Saturday, May 27th, 2006, Cadet Michael Moad strode across another stage ... this time receiving his USMA diploma from President George W. Bush as he graduated 13th in a class of over 900 cadets before taking his oath of office as a 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Army.

- 3 **Jean Weil** - Co-founder of the Nationals, Jean had a unique vision that would ultimately transform the event in ways both subtle and dramatic. She created the 16'x16' eagle banner that hangs proudly in the Arena, along with the performance boards and each year's event design. Upon her passing in 1999, the Jean Weil Memorial Scholarship Fund was created that will forever allow her contribution to be so richly remembered.
- 4 **Paul Naki & the King's Guard** - With a style that was breath-taking and precision that was stunning, the King's Guard set the art of drill on fire. Their innovations sent shock waves through the JROTC community and produced an explosive creative growth that may never be equaled.

- 10 **The cadets of La Salle Military Academy** - The first decade of the Nationals was overwhelmingly dominated by the LSMA style which was born from the confidence and skill of these unique National Champions.
- 11 **Sharron Ritch** - In her first year at Sports Network International, Sharron changed the world of the Nationals through the creation of an Access database that would allow SNI to manage larger events with fluidity and precision. Her abilities allowed SNI to fine-tune our events with a professionalism that makes her irreplaceable.
- 12 **Ocean Center** - Moving into this state-of-the-art facility allowed the event to create an identity that matched the excellence of the teams. The Nationals is synonymous with this building and inspires awe in each cadet that enters.
- 13 **CDR Armando Solis** - Through his inspiring leadership at Flour Bluff HS, CDR Solis has redefined the standard for creating a national championship team through perfection in each detail and a remarkable affinity for capturing the essence of true excellence while maintaining a truly joyful esprit de corps.
- 14 **SgtMaj. Keith Williams** - No one individual has better emulated the fundamental qualities of the Nationals - honor, determination, preparation and a quest for excellence that is unstoppable; all of which have made a remarkable impact on the judges he has led and the cadets he has inspected!
- 15 **1stSgt. Christopher Borghease** - No single judge has been more revered or loved by the Nationals' cadets; his intensity and dedication to bringing out the best in each cadet has made 1stSgt. Borghease a living legend.
- 16 **MSgt. Robert Barnette** - As a long time judge at the Nationals, MSgt. Barnette has a profound love for the Nationals and the difference it has made in so many cadets' lives. His passion set the tone for all judges.
- 17 **SCPO Joe Draper** - In the earlier days of the Nationals, SCPO Draper served as the Event Head Judge for many years, guiding the event into the future and setting a sterling example for all judges to follow.

- 23 **SGM Johnny Snodgrass** - A powerful presence in the world of competition drill, SGM Snodgrass led Enterprise HS to countless victories and was the Alternative Arms Dynasty with his "Belles" throughout the 90's.
- 24 **Mr. Bill Brady** - A Pearl Harbor survivor and local veterans group representative, Bill Brady reached out to special performance units and teams alike in welcoming them to Daytona Beach. His heart was as big as the Nationals and when he passed away he left a lasting memory of warmth and caring that will never be forgotten.
- 25 **SGM Dennis Hastings** - Through the sponsorship of the Corps of Cadets at Texas A&M University, SGM Hastings has not only brought millions of dollars in scholarships to Nationals cadets, he has also ushered in an era of corporate support and involvement that saw the creation of the Nationals Benefactors Guild.

Competition Guidelines

All units use the regulations of their own service to best compete at the NHSDTC, however in Armed Divisions where their manual is not specific, U.S. Army FM 3-21.5 is used. In the Unarmed Division, U.S. Air Force FM 36-2203 (1996) is used. The variety of services that have gained top finishes at Daytona is a testament to the fairness of this drill event. The event SOP is mailed to all registered schools in mid-January and posted on the website. Schools having specific questions regarding the event should contact SNI before applying for entry.

Event Judging

All judges at the NHSDTC maintain a strong background in military drill. Judges are fully qualified military personnel representing all four branches of the service. Judges are given extensive judging manuals in advance of the event, as well as a full on-site briefing on the eve of the competition. The Nationals' judges are extremely motivated and give a 110% effort. This remains a major reason why so many teams look to end their drill season at "**The World's Most Famous Beach.**"

Competition Events

The NHSDTC maintains two competition levels. The **Challenge Level** event is designed for drill teams who wish to be part of the Nationals experience while competing against similarly talented schools at a less intense skill level than the Masters Level. The Challenge Level maintains Armed (demilitarized weapons only) & Unarmed divisions. All schools are also encouraged to consider entering "stand-alone" Color Guard units into the exciting Open Level Color Guard competition also held on Friday during the Challenge Level event.

Schools may enter multiple complete teams in different divisions at the Nationals **as long as no cadet competes for more than one team**. Therefore, schools entering both an armed and unarmed team may do so, but the two teams **must have separate cadets for each team**. This rule allows maximum cadet participation without adding multiple school entries utilizing the same cadets.

All Masters Level Armed units are allowed two entries (per team) in both Solo & Dual Exhibition. Unarmed Masters units can enter two pairs in Unarmed Dual Exhibition. Also, **ALL CADETS** are urged to compete in their level's Armed & Unarmed Knockout Drills **NOTE:** no "knockout fee" is charged to participate in this event.

NHSDTC Event Specifics

The National High School Drill Team Championships are held at the impressive **Ocean Center Civic Arena** in Daytona Beach, Florida in late Spring every year. This state-of-the-art facility features permanent seating for over 6,000 with outstanding amenities for a drill competition the size and prestige of the Nationals. The Ocean Center also features a complete concession area and ample bus parking. All instructors and cadets who attend the Nationals will attest that the Ocean Center Complex remains the most exceptional drill & ceremony facility currently in use in the United States.

Schools are housed in Daytona Beach at one of 20+ oceanfront hotels located within 10 minutes of the Ocean Center Arena. They provide quality & affordable billeting for every Nationals team. Marine Corps Dominates the Challenge Level in Daytona Beach

The Challenge Level and Open Level Color Guard (OLCG) competitions at the Nationals have developed the deserved reputation as tightly fought slugfests that often come down to the final performance to determine a victor. As more JROTC programs improve their drill teams, Friday's events become more impressive every year! Top-finishing Challenge Level teams are making the step into the Masters Level with greater ease, proving that the talent gap between these two events narrows every year. OLCG performances are often a thing of beauty - making spectators and judges proud to watch such respectful and synchronized displays of the Colors. You never know what you might see at this exciting competition level and in 2006, the classic displays of team synchronization and bearing were the impressive factors that swayed the judges. Quite often, these qualities are best displayed by Marines.

ARMED DIVISION

Schools from 16 states brought together a huge diversity of drill styles in the Armed Division. Four different teams captured the four different team events, leaving most onlookers to wonder who would take control of this talented field of competitors? As the scoresheets began piling higher, it became clear that **Lynn English HS** from **Lynn, Massachusetts** would do just that! The USMC **Bulldogs** drill team was solid everywhere, nabbing trophies in Regulation (1st), Exhibition (3rd) & Color Guard (4th). Their overall display of excellence routed the competition field and ensured that their entry into the Masters Level competition in the future would be well deserved.

Always tough **Clearwater HS** from **Clearwater, Florida** came to win but a very poor 18th place Color Guard finish put these hard-charging leathernecks in too deep a hole to dig out. The **Tornadoes** strong 1st place (Exhibition) and 2nd place (Inspection) finishes saved their overall placement and earned them the runner-up title.

With a pack of three schools fighting for a 3rd place Overall Armed title, the Navy JROTC program from **Central Crossing HS** broke through and had just enough to push to the front. Paced by two trophy finishes (1st-Inspection, 3rd-Regulation), the **Comets** drill team distinguished themselves at this tough event and powered home to their highest overall finish ever at this event.

Other solid Armed finishes: **Passaic HS** (1st-CG); **Campbell Co. HS** (3rd-CG, 5th-Reg); **Northeast HS** (2nd-Reg); **Montgomery Cen. HS** (2nd-CG); **Hialeah-Miami Lakes HS** (2nd-Ex); **Airport HS** (3rd-Ins); and **Clearwater HS** (4th-Reg, 5th-CG).

UNARMED DIVISION

With the absence of 2005 Challenge Unarmed Champs **Bethel Regional HS**, the competition was expected to be wide open. Their two top finishes gave Lynn English a Challenge Level sweep, thereby providing a rousing send-off to the Masters Level in the future.

Traveling all the way from Alaska didn't seem to bother these hearty Air Force cadets as **West Anchorage HS** from **Anchorage, Alaska** had plenty of

firepower to capture the Unarmed Runner-up title. The **Eagles** drill team worked hard to nab first place in both Color Guard and Exhibition to cruise home with the 2nd place Overall finish.

A hard fought 3rd place Overall finish was taken by **N. Miami Beach Sr. HS** from **N. Miami Beach, Florida**. Despite three strong trophy finishes (1st-Regulation, 2nd-Color Guard, 5th-Exhibition), a lackluster 18th place finish in Inspection left the **Lady Chargers** in 3rd place.

The division's other strong finishes included: **Myrtle Beach HS** (1st-Ins); **Washington HS** (2nd-Ex); **Trevor Browne HS** (3rd-Ins & Reg); **Long Island City HS** (4th-Ex, 5th-Ins); **Bainbridge HS** (4th-Ins); **Hialeah-Miami Lakes HS** (4th-Reg) and **East Henderson HS** (4th-CG).

DAYTONA BEACH, Florida has become synonymous with military JROTC drill & ceremony excellence. For over 20 years, the finest military drillers in the world have come to "The Nationals" with lofty dreams and left with cherished memories. While several Masters Level schools are content to just do their best, most want to be recognized and remembered as the program that dethroned the King!

Both Flour Bluff and Fern Creek would give nothing away therefore any team looking to make their mark as champions would have to wrestle the title away - it would not be handed to them gently. Scores of schools have tried to become the victor year after year, but could this be the year a new team would break through and reach the holy grail of an Overall Championship at Daytona?

ALTERNATIVE ARMS DIVISION

Any chances of Fern Creek HS from Fern Creek, Kentucky having their unprecedeted run of championships ended in 2006 were shattered early as the **Lady Leathernecks** came out stronger and sharper than ever! While **DOMINATION** is a word too often used in competition, it is the only appropriate description. Capturing four out of the five events (Color Guard and Platoon Exhibition by MASSIVE margins) with only a narrow 2nd place Squad Exhibition finish keeping these annual champions from a clean sweep, the thoroughbreds from Kentucky easily brushed aside any serious challenge to their reign from the outset. Like Tiger Woods in golf, the only question remaining seems to be, "How many years before a challenger steps forward to conquer these ladies?" With many schools already contacting SNI about the 25th anniversary, we expect a talent-rich competition field in 2007 to put every school to the test on the drill floor.

An incredibly tight battle ensued for the Division Runner-up title. Just a few points dictated a stirring victory by 2006 Runner-up **Palm Bay HS** from Palm Bay, Florida. The always strong **Lady Pirates** held four trophy finishes featuring strong 3rd place finishes in both Inspection and Regulation for this fine Marine program.

Palm Bay's efforts barely nudged out the tough Army JROTC unit from **Winter Springs HS** in Winter Springs, Florida. While they had four strong trophy finishes as well, the **Golden Bears** took a tough 8th place finish in Platoon Exhibition to land in the 3rd place overall slot.

The Alternative Arms Division had several other notable finishes including: **Montgomery Central HS** (2nd-Inspection, Regulation, Color Guard); **Mt. Juliet HS** (1st-Squad Ex, 4th-Regulation); **J.H. Reagan HS** (3rd-Squad Ex, 4th-Color Guard); **Carroll HS** (2nd-Platoon Ex) and **Southeast HS** (3rd-Platoon Ex).

UNARMED DIVISION

Despite a solid competition field, the entire division really came down to a two-horse match race right from the beginning. The **Sea Hawks** Unarmed drill unit from **Flour Bluff HS**, coming off a stellar Navy Nationals competition squared off against the Army Eastern Region Champion **Patriot Pride** Unarmed drill unit from **Francis Lewis HS**. Like a heavyweight prize fight, each landed big punches early.

The Army challengers from **Fresh Meadows, New York** grabbed 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th place event trophies to put them in serious striking distance. But they hit the canvas hard for a TKO when they garnered an 8th place in Element Ex. That soft finish left the four-year reigning Navy champs from **Corpus Christi, Texas** in command of the division. The ladies from South Texas were paced by two 1st place finishes and two 2nd place finishes to tack up their 4th consecutive Unarmed Division National Championship title. Teams are already calling and emailing ready to challenge their reign in 2007!

enough strength to edge out the always tough **Rahway HS Lady Devil Pups** from **Rahway, New Jersey** for 3rd place overall. Rahway is so solid in so many areas they are a threat to take home the tallest hardware every year they attend.

Other Unarmed Division highlights included: **Theodore Roosevelt HS** (1st-Inspection, 5th Element Ex); **Ronald Reagan HS** (3rd-Inspection, 4th-Regulation and Element Ex); **Sandalwood HS** (2nd-Color Guard) and **Douglas MacArthur HS** (5th-Inspection and Color Guard).





The Iwo Jima Rabbi and the Speech heard 'round the World

The fight for Iwo Jima in 1945 was one of the bloodiest of World War II. A tiny volcanic island in the Pacific, Iwo Jima was the setting for a five-week, non-stop battle between 70,000 U.S. Marines and a huge, unknown number of entrenched, determined Japanese defenders. The courage and gallantry of the American forces, showcased by the dramatic raising of the American flag over Mt. Suribachi, is memorialized in the Marine Corps monument in Washington, DC. Less remembered, however, is that the battle occasioned an eloquent eulogy by a Marine Corps rabbi that has become an American classic.



Rabbi Roland B. Gittelsohn (1910-1995), assigned to the 5th Marine Division, was the first Jewish chaplain the Marine Corps ever appointed. The American invading force at Iwo Jima included approximately 1,500 Jewish Marines. Rabbi Gittelsohn was in the thick of the fray, ministering to Marines of all faiths in the combat zone. He shared the fear and horror of the fighting men, each of whom knew that each day might be his last. Rabbi Gittelsohn's tireless efforts to comfort the wounded and encourage the fearful won him three service ribbons.

When the fighting was over, Division Chaplain Warren Cuthriell, a Protestant minister, asked Rabbi Gittelsohn to deliver the memorial sermon at a combined religious service dedicating the Marine Cemetery. Cuthriell wanted all the fallen Marines – black and white, Protestant, Catholic and Jewish – honored in a single, nondenominational ceremony. Unfortunately, racial and religious prejudice was strong in the Marine Corps, as it was then throughout America. According to Rabbi Gittelsohn, the majority of Christian chaplains objected to having a rabbi preach over predominantly Christian graves.

The Catholic chaplains, in keeping with church doctrine, opposed any form of joint religious service. To his credit, Cuthriell refused to alter his plans. Gittelsohn, on the other hand, wanted to save his friend Cuthriell further embarrassment and so decided it was best not to deliver his sermon. Instead, three separate religious services were held. At the Jewish service, to a congregation of 70 or so who attended, Rabbi Gittelsohn delivered the powerful eulogy he originally wrote for the combined service:

"Here lie men who loved America because their ancestors generations ago helped in her founding, and other men who loved her with equal passion because they themselves or their own fathers escaped from oppression to her blessed shores. Here lie officers and men, Negroes and whites, rich men and poor . . . together. Here are Protestants, Catholics and Jews together. Here no man prefers another because of his faith or despises him because of his color. Here there are no quotas of how many from each group are admitted or allowed. Among these men, there is no discrimination. No prejudices. No hatred. Theirs is the highest and purest democracy ...

Whosoever of us lifts his hand in hate against a brother, or who thinks himself superior to those who happen to be in the minority, makes of this ceremony and the bloody sacrifice it commemorates, an empty, hollow mockery. To this, then, as our solemn duty, sacred duty do we the living now dedicate ourselves: to the right of Protestants, Catholics, and Jews, of white men and Negroes alike, to enjoy the democracy for which all of them have here paid the price ...

We here solemnly swear that this shall not be in vain. Out of this and from the suffering and sorrow of those who mourn this will come, we promise, the birth of a new freedom for the sons of men everywhere."

Among Gittelsohn's listeners were three Protestant chaplains so incensed by the prejudice voiced by their colleagues that they boycotted their own service to attend Gittelsohn's. One of them borrowed the manuscript and, unknown to Gittelsohn, circulated several thousand copies to his regiment. Some Marines enclosed the copies in letters to their families. An avalanche of coverage resulted. Time magazine published excerpts, which wire services spread even further. The entire sermon was inserted into the "Congressional Record," the Army released the eulogy for short-wave broadcast to American troops throughout the world and radio commentator Robert St. John read it on his program and on many succeeding Memorial Days.

In 1995, in his last major public appearance before his death, Gittelsohn re-read a portion of the eulogy at the fiftieth commemoration ceremony at the Iwo Jima statue in Washington, D.C. In his autobiography, Gittelsohn reflected, "I have often wondered whether anyone would ever have heard of my Iwo Jima sermon had it not been for the bigoted attempt to ban it."




