General Colin Powell, U.S. Army, ret.

Colin Powell was born in New York City on April 5th, 1937. General Powell served as the 12th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Department of Defense, from October 1, 1989 to September 30, 1993, under both President George Bush and President Bill Clinton.

The son of Jamaican immigrants, Powell was raised in the South Bronx, New York. He was educated in the New York City public schools, and at City College of New York (CCNY). He participated in ROTC at CCNY and received a commission as an Army 2nd lieutenant upon graduation. He subsequently received a Master of Business Administration degree from George Washington University.

General Powell has been the recipient of numerous U.S. military decorations, including the Bronze Star Medal, Defense Distinguished Service Medal, and the Purple Heart. His civilian awards include the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the Congressional Gold Medal, and an honorary knighthood from the Queen of England.

During the period after Vietnam, Powell overcame racism by just doing his job as a soldier, and not as a combatant in America's race war. He never allowed his race to be a disadvantage. "I beat it by making it not my problem, but the racists' problem. I'm going to force you to see who I am by my performance. Accept me for what I am."

People who write about Powell's life say he symbolizes the fact that the military has dealt with the problem of integration better than any other institution. They say he has also made a special effort to serve as a role model for young blacks.

The retired general's view of America, which he delivers with great passion, is one of hope and promise. Powell believes that for too many years we have been building jails to hold young people who have failed. They have failed because, to a great extent, we have failed them.

In Colin Powell's Words

Reflections and wisdom from one of the greatest contemporary, military and social leaders of our time

We have failed them by not giving them the vision, the resources, and the purpose they need to grow up as law-abiding, successful, and contributing members of society. We have failed them by leaving them vulnerable to drug abuse, gangs, violence, premarital sex, and other social pathologies.

Kids need safe places and constructive things to do in their after-school hours. They need a healthy start in life, as God and nature intended. They need a marketable skill through effective education, so that they will be self-supporting and contributing members of society when they grow up. Finally, they need a chance to give back through service to others so that they can take pride in knowing that the world needs them and their talents.

Colin Powell is a proven man of leadership, character and vision. From a lifetime full of challenges & victories, he shares many of the experiences that shaped his life.

Colin Powell on: The Pershing Rifles

I experienced the novel pleasure of being courted by the three military societies on campus, the Webb Patrol, Scabbard and Blade, and the Pershing Rifles, ROTC counterparts of fraternities... I pledged the PRs because they were the elite of the three groups.

One Pershing Rifles member impressed me from the start. Ronald Brooks was a young black man, tall, trim, handsome, the son of a Harlem Baptist preacher and possessed of a maturity beyond most college students. Ronnie was only two years older than I, but something in him commanded deference. And unlike me, Ronnie, a chemistry major, was a brilliant student. He was a cadet leader in the ROTC and an officer in the Pershing Rifles. He could drill men so that they moved like parts of a watch. Ronnie was sharp, quick, disciplined, organized, qualities then invisible in Colin Powell. I had found a model and a mentor. I set out to remake myself in the Ronnie Brooks mold.

My experience in high school, on basketball and track teams, and briefly in Boy Scouting had never produced a sense of belonging or many permanent friendships. The Pershing Rifles did. For the first time in my life I was a member of a brotherhood. The discipline, the structure, the camaraderie, the sense of belonging were what I craved. I became a leader almost immediately. I found a selflessness within our ranks that reminded me of the caring atmosphere within my family. Race, color, background, and income meant nothing. The PRs would go the limit for each other and for the group. If this was what soldiering was all about, then maybe I wanted to be a soldier.

Colin Powell on: His Favorite Story

ABC correspondent Sam Donaldson was interviewing a young African American soldier in a tank platoon on the eve of battle in Desert Storm. Donaldson asked, "How do you think the battle will go? Are you afraid?" "We will do OK. We're well trained and I'm not afraid," the GI answered, gesturing toward his buddies around him. "I'm not afraid because I'm with my family." The other soldiers shouted, "Tell him again. He didn't hear you."

The soldier repeated, "This is my family and we'll take care of each other." That story never fails to touch me or the audience. It is a metaphor for what we have to do as a nation. We have to start thinking of America as a family. We have to stop screeching at each other, stop hurting each other, and instead start caring for, sacrificing for and sharing with each other.

Colin Powell on: President Bill Clinton

We got along very, very well. We obviously had differences on some issues such as gays and lesbians in the military. But as a personal matter, we got along very well and we do to this day. When we first started working together at the beginning of his administration and we had this very difficult issue of whether or not to allow gays and lesbians in the military, and I said to him after one of the first meetings on this subject, I said, "Mr. President, I'm very, very sorry that this had to be the first issue that you had to deal with in the military. I had hoped it would be something else and I regret that this is the case."

And what he said to me was, "I understand that, Colin, but, you know, this is a very tough issue. If it was easy, somebody would have solved it before we came along, so we will just work this problem."

Colin Powell on: His Parents Basic Message

My parents raised two children to whom they gave a precious gift, a set of core beliefs. A value system founded on a clear understanding of the difference between right and wrong and a belief in the Almighty. They taught us integrity, kindness and Godliness were right. Lying, violence, intolerance, crime and drugs were wrong and, even worse than wrong, they were shameful. In my family we were taught that hard work and education were the keys to success. My sister and I were taught to believe in ourselves. We might be considered poor, but we were rich in spirit. But, stick with it, because in America, justice will eventually triumph and the powerful, searing promise of the founding fathers will come true. We were taught by my parents to always, always, always believe in America.

Colin Powell's 13 Rules of Life:

1. It ain't as bad as you think. It will look better in the morning.
2. Get mad; then get over it.
3. Avoid having your ego so close to your position that when your position falls, your ego goes with it.
4. It can be done!
5. Be careful what you choose. You may get it.
6. Don't let adverse facts stand in the way of a good decision.
7. Check small things.
8. Share credit.
9. You can't make someone else's choices. You shouldn't let someone else make yours.
10. Remain calm. Be kind.
11. Have a vision. Be demanding.
12. Don't take counsel of your fears from naysayers.
13. Perpetual optimism is a force multiplier.

National Capital Drill Classic

U.S. ARMY 4TH BRIGADE,
1ST REGION CHAMPIONSHIPS
WASHINGTON, D.C.

When the cool winds blow through the cherry blossom trees lining the tidal basin in front of the Jefferson Memorial in the Nation's Capital, everyone knows -- **IT'S TIME TO DRILL!** The **DC National Guard Armory** provided a wonderful, historic setting for the competition field of 32 schools to display the fruits of their sweat and dedication.

The NCDC begins with the impressive "Parade of Colors" Opening Ceremony. This ceremony, led by **C/Major Hope Williams** of Woodrow Wilson H.S., featured the presentation & posting of the colors from all competing units. The event was then officially kicked-off with by brief speeches by **Commanding General Stewart W. Wallace**, U.S. Army Cadet Command and **Mr. Todd A. Weiler**, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Army Manpower and Reserve Affairs.

Four team events in both the Armed and Unarmed Divisions comprise the NCDC team scoring. These events are: Unit Inspection, Platoon Regulation, Color Guard & Platoon Exhibition. A tight competition schedule makes for a long day of exciting team performances at this single-day 4th Brigade Championship drill event.

Armed Division

Some things change and some things stay the same every year at any drill meet. One constant at the NCDC is the strength of **Thomas Stone H.S.** from **Waldorf, Maryland** who repeated as Brigade Armed Champions with a truly overpowering effort. Readied by **CSM Charles Henson**, the **Cougars Blue** drill team earned first place finishes in Regulation and Color Guard along with 3rd place Inspection and 4th place Exhibition Drill finishes. Thomas Stone stomped their competitors in one of the largest margins of victory ever seen in the overall scoring at the NCDC.

Showing off the all-around versatility and strength that has become their trade-mark, **T.C. Williams H.S.** from **Alexandria, Virginia** finished a solid 2nd within the Armed Division. The **Armageddon Red** drill team captured trophies in three of the four team events (2nd place-Regulation and Color Guard; 5th place-Exhibition) and just missed a trophy in Inspection.

Earning a 3rd place overall finish, **Woodbridge Senior H.S.** from **Woodbridge, Virginia** continues to improve and is a force to watch for at the 2000 NCDC. The Armed Division was filled with other top performances high-lighted by: **Dunbar H.S.** (1st place Exhibition); **Liberty H.S.** (1st place Inspection, 4th place Color Guard); **Lake Clifton/Eastern HS** (3rd place Exhibition) and **Manchester H.S.** (3rd place Color Guard).

Unarmed Division

Hitting on all cylinders, **T.C. Williams H.S.** surpassed their Armed Division success with the Unarmed Division Championship. Led by drill team instructor **1SG LaGrant Smith**, the **Armageddon Blue** drill team repeated their 1998 championship and came out of the chute fast in their core disciplines, gaining 1st place in both Inspection and Regulation events and also gaining a 3rd place finish in both Color Guard and Exhibition.

Improving one place from 1998, **Thomas Stone H.S.** coupled their Armed Overall win with an Unarmed Runner-up title. The **Cougars Gold** top finish came from well-rounded performances in all areas (1st place Color Guard, 3rd place Regulation, 4th place Exhibition and 5th place Inspection).

Finishing a distant 3rd place overall within the Unarmed Division was **Lake Clifton/Eastern HS** from **Baltimore, Maryland**. Other strong finishes included: **Forestville H.S.** (1st place Exhibition); **Howard H.S.** (2nd place Inspection, 4th place Color Guard); **Martinsville H.S.** (2nd place Regulation, 4th Inspection); **Woodrow Wilson H.S.** (2nd place Color Guard) and **Thomas Walker H.S.** (3rd place Inspection).

The evening culminated with a pressure-filled Awards Ceremony that had everyone in the nail-biting mode. Powerful closing speeches were put forth by **General Stewart W. Wallace** and by Washington, D.C. Mayor **Anthony Williams**.

Along with all event team trophies, the **Mayor's Trophy** was presented to the highest finishing JROTC unit in Washington, D.C. The 1999 trophy went to top finisher **Anacostia H.S.**

Support for the NCDC begins at the top with D.C. Armory **Commanding General, Warren G. Freeman**. Without his strong support, the NCDC could not be presented in the first-class manner that the Armory provides. Also, the judging corps from the **U.S. Army Old Guard** gave another fantastic effort.

Sports Network would like to thank everyone who makes the NCDC a special part of their annual drill calendar. We are honored to produce this event for all the dedicated schools throughout the 4th Brigade and hope to see them all at the 2000 NCDC scheduled for **Saturday, March 11th** at the DC National Guard Armory.

NJROTC Nationals

Picture a demanding competition that tests the mental, physical, and drill training of up to 40 of your finest cadets. Now picture this competition in front of a thousand cheering onlookers over two days surrounded by twenty other elite Navy Junior ROTC programs hand-selected to represent the seven Naval Areas and you have the **NJROTC Nationals - Academic, Athletic and Drill Championships**.

April, 1999 brought together many of the finest all-around Navy JROTC units for an event that has come to be known as simply the "Navy Nationals." The **Great Lakes Recruit Training Center** in Great Lakes, Illinois served as the perfect backdrop for this prestigious event.

The event began on Friday afternoon with **Unit Personnel Inspection**. This event required the inspection of each unit's entire compliment of competing cadets. Grabbing first place in this event was **Flour Bluff H.S.** from Corpus Christi, Texas. Their well-disciplined and experienced unit earned an impressive 1271 points out of 1500, beating out a hard charge by **William Allen H.S.** (1220 pts.) from Allentown, Pennsylvania and tough **Oviedo H.S.** (1145 pts.) from Oviedo, Florida.

Friday evening featured the **Academic Exam** event. Schools formed 15-cadet academic teams with each cadet taking a 100-question test on relevant Navy JROTC information. This provided a possible 1500-point team total. When all of the pencils were finally put down, the dynamic competitors from **Cape Fear H.S.** in Cape Fear, North Carolina earned the scholastic victory with a total team score of 1103 points. The team was led by Cadet Sherry Starling (1st-95 pts.) and Cadet Richard Brunkhorst (2nd-92 pts.), who earned the two highest individual scores in the 315 cadet exam field.

Proving that every single question counts, **Nease H.S.** from St. Augustine, Florida grabbed 2nd place (1079 pts.), beating 3rd place **Flour Bluff H.S.** by just one correct answer (1078 pts.).

Cadets got a good night sleep and then hit the deck early Saturday morning to compete at the indoor drill hall in the **Athletic Competition**. Athletics were comprised of four team events: Push-ups; Curl-ups; 8x440-yd. Oval Relay and 16x100-yd. Shuttle Relay.

Many stellar team performances were on display with the highlight being the athletic display put forth by **Oviedo H.S.** who literally ran away with the Overall Athletic Championship. The team raced to victory in both the Oval Relay and Shuttle Relay events. This, along with solid Push-up and Curl-up scores, gave Oviedo a winning score of 996 points (out of a possible 1200).

Just missing the overall athletic title was **Mar Vista H.S.** from Imperial Beach, California (1st place Team Push-up and Team Curl-up; 2nd place Oval Relay; 3rd place Shuttle Relay) with 980 points, followed by **Silver Bluff H.S.** from Aiken, South Carolina (2nd place Shuttle Relay) with 970 points.

In the early afternoon, the final phase of the NJROTC Nationals began -- the crowd-pleasing **Drill Competition**. This segment was comprised of five team events totaling 1500 possible points: Armed & Unarmed Platoon Basic; Armed & Unarmed Platoon Exhibition and Color Guard.

Powering their way to a convincing Overall Drill Championship was **Flour Bluff H.S.** The powerhouse NJROTC unit won three of the five drill events (Armed Basic, Armed & Unarmed Exhibition) on their way to amassing a solid 1138 point total.

Grabbing the drill competition Runner-up title was **Clark H.S.** from Las Vegas, Nevada (1st place Color Guard; 2nd place Unarmed Exhibition; 3rd place Armed Exhibition & Armed Basic - 1042 pts.) who just edged out **Boca Raton H.S.** from Boca Raton, Florida (1st place Unarmed Basic; 2nd place Armed Basic; and a 3rd place Unarmed Exhibition). This left the tough competitors just 9 points back with a total of 1033 points.

With the scored events completed, the Armed and Unarmed Knockout Drills preceded a fantastic Awards Ceremony for the presentation of the beautiful competition trophies. After all of the individual and event awards were presented, the ceremony crowned the NJROTC Nationals Overall Champion, **Flour Bluff High School**; the Overall Runner-up, **Oviedo High School**; and the Overall 3rd Place Finisher, **Boca Raton High School**.

Special thanks go out to **Rear Admiral Edward E. Hunter, Commander, Great Lakes R.T.C.** Along with providing a truly inspirational speech at the Awards Ceremony, the NJROTC Nationals would not have been possible without his far-reaching and genuine support.

The weekend at Great Lakes was both an exciting and challenging experience for all, with excellence around every corner. The Navy's best and brightest are already gearing-up for the 2000 NJROTC Nationals, scheduled to return to Great Lakes on April 7th-8th. Introduction

Sports Network International is pleased to provide this invitation to all precision drill units to attend the 18th annual **National High School Drill Team Championships** in Daytona Beach, Florida. This event is open to all high school JROTC units and select other military-style programs competing in Armed & Unarmed divisions. This is your school's **official invitation to enter the nation's finest JROTC drill and ceremony competition, referred to worldwide as simply "The Nationals."**

The **National High School Drill Team Championships** remain the most coveted drill destination in the nation. Schools travel from across the U.S. to attend this all-service drill spectacular. Schools considering entry into the **Nationals** should make plans early as competition spaces are limited to roughly **50 schools at the Masters Level; 30 schools at the Challenge Level; and 20 schools within the Open Level Color Guard event.**

Sports Network International, Inc. (SNI) serves as the Event Manager for the Nationals. The 2000 National High School Drill Team Championships are proudly sponsored and supported by the **U.S. Army Cadet Command**.

Competition Guidelines

All schools drill and are judged in accordance with their own service manual. In Armed Divisions where their manual is not specific, U.S. Army FM 22-5 (1986) is used. In the Unarmed Division, U.S. Air Force FM 36-2203 (1996) is used. The variety of services that have gained top finishes at Daytona is a testament to the fairness of this drill event. The event SOP is mailed to all registered schools in mid-January. Schools having questions regarding any rules & procedures in use for this drill meet should feel free to contact SNI before registering for the competition.

Event Judging

All judges at the NHSDTC maintain a strong background in military drill. Judges are fully qualified military personnel representing all four branches of the service. All judges are given extensive judging manuals in advance of the event, as well as a full on-site briefing on the eve of the competition. The Nationals' judges are extremely motivated and give a 110% effort. This remains a major reason why so many teams look to end their drill season at **"The World's Most Famous Beach."**

Competition Events

The NHSDTC maintains two competition levels. The **Challenge Level** is designed for drill teams who wish to be part of the Nationals experience while competing against similarly talented schools at a less intense skill level than the two-day **Masters Level** event. Military schools and teams drilling with facsimile weapons cannot enter the Challenge Level event. Schools looking to enter "stand-alone" color guard units are also eligible to enter up to two units in the Open Level Color Guard event.

The **Masters Level** is designed to compete the finest drill programs in the nation together within three separate divisions. Teams utilizing standard demilitarized rifles compete in the **Demilitarized Arms Division**. Teams competing without weapons enter the **Unarmed Division**. The **Alternative Arms Division** is for teams using lightweight, facsimile weapons (regardless of their gender) AND teams that are all-female (regardless of the weapon type used).

- ★Flight Exhibition (13 & over-no max)

Schools may enter multiple complete teams in different divisions at the Nationals, **as long as no cadet competes for more than one team**. Therefore, schools entering both an armed and unarmed team may do so, but the two teams **must have separate cadets for each team**. This rule allows maximum cadet participation without adding multiple school entries utilizing the same cadets.

All Masters Level Armed units are allowed two entries (per team) in both Solo & Dual Exhibition events. Unarmed Masters units can enter two pairs in Unarmed Dual Exhibition. Also, **ALL CADETS** are urged to compete in their level's Armed & Unarmed Knockout Drills.

NHSDTC Event Specifics

The National High School Drill Team Championships are held at the impressive **Ocean Center Civic Arena** in Daytona Beach, Florida in late Spring every year. This state-of-the-art facility features permanent seating for over 6,000 with outstanding amenities for a drill competition the size and prestige of the Nationals. The Ocean Center also features a complete concession area and plentiful bus & car parking. All cadets and instructors who attend the Nationals will attest that the Ocean Center remains the most exceptional drill & ceremony facility currently in use in the United States.

Schools are housed in Daytona Beach at one of 12 oceanfront hotels. All of these hotels are located within 10 minutes of the Ocean Center Arena. They provide quality & affordable billeting for every Nationals team. New in 2000, SNI will offer select teams the ability to choose billeting at the luxurious **Radisson Resort Hotel**. The event is expected to be full on December 6th, with only standby slots available after this date.

Additional Registration Info

Schools accepted for entry will be mailed confirmations on December 6th. Any school not accepted into the NHSDTC will have their Registration Entry Fee refunded within 10 business days from the review deadline.

JROTC MARCHES ONTO THE WEB!

AS THE INTERNET CELEBRATES ITS 30TH BIRTHDAY THIS YEAR, USAGE OF THIS AWESOME TOOL BY JUNIOR ROTC UNITS WORLDWIDE HAS GROWN FROM A NOVELTY TO A NECESSITY

The internet has become a marvelous instrument that brings the wonders and information of the world right to your desktop. More and more Junior ROTC units are integrating computers and the internet into their program, allowing their cadets the excitement and knowledge that the world wide web can bring. Using the web responsibly can be a unlimited source of useful information -- invaluable for any striving high school student in and out of the JROTC program.

While experienced "web surfers" have no problem zipping from site to site, finding information on the web can be somewhat challenging and confusing for the newer user. With some basic "how-to" on the internet along with a firm foundation of great websites, this information will give every user a solid starting point for obtaining useful military data or just plain having fun!

How Do I Find Information?

Search engines do a great job of sifting through the hundreds of billions of web pages that are available to web surfers. These giant electronic indexes allow you to see just those web pages that involve the topics you select. There are several hundred of these search engines. When you become more experienced, what you are looking for will usually determine which one you will use. However, three excellent search engines to work with are www.yahoo.com, www.metacrawler.com & www.infoseek.com. With a few simple words or phrases, these search engines will provide you endless options on finding anything on the web. Always remember when typing in site addresses to type it EXACTLY as you see it -- upper case vs lower case matters!

Where Should I Begin My Web Browsing Experience?

The page that comes up when you open your web browser (you are probably using either Netscape Navigator or Internet Explorer) is called your Home Page or Start Page. Most people configure their browser to start with a site called a portal or gateway. This type of site maintains information and links taylored to your specific tastes and interests that you can look at when you first "log-on." Many outstanding portals are available to web surfers, with two of the best being www.go.com or www.excite.com. Both of these can be fully integrated to maintain items of interest to the user, including sports, weather, news and other particular information.

What Other Sites Should I Have at my Fingertips?

Within your Bookmarks (Netscape Navigator) or Favorites (Internet Explorer) folder, all units should also have the links to basic Governmental offices. These include: the *White House* (www.whitehouse.gov); the *Senate* (www.senate.gov) and the *House of Representatives* (www.house.gov). These sites have infinite uses, but mainly are used to contact your elected federal representatives. Also, the Library of Congress (lcweb.loc.gov/homepage/lchp.html) is an awesome site to have immediate access to historical information, as well as follow Congressional Bills as they move through the legislative process.



Two other "must have" sites for Junior ROTC units include the Springfield High School site of all-service JROTC links (glass.toledolink.com/~kinner/JROTC/drillink.html); and of course, the Sports Network International homepage (www.mindspring.com/~thenationals) which is a great starting point for drill info in general or on SNI events in particular.

Along with the obvious official military home sites for each service branch, check out some of the **unofficial military sites**. These sites are *not affiliated with the military* and are often set-up by individuals. three finish in three of the five team events, paced by a 1st place Armed Regulation that was led by Armed Commander's Trophy champion **C/Cdr Carvalho**. Their first attendance at the Nationals was impressive as this **Deerfield Beach, Florida** program made the statement that they are a force to be reckoned with at the Nationals.

Other outstanding Armed Division performances included: **Cedar Shoals HS** (2nd-Platoon Ex, 5th-Squad Ex, Inspection & Regulation); **Grove City HS** (2nd-Inspection, 4th-Regulation & Platoon Ex); **Winnsboro HS** (1st-Color Guard); **Topeka HS** (2nd-Regulation & Commander's Trophy); **Woodlawn HS** (2nd-Color Guard); **Clearwater HS** (3rd-Inspection & Regulation); **Perry County Central HS** (3rd-Color Guard); **Forest Park HS** (3rd-Squad Ex) and **North Augusta HS** (4th-Inspection & Squad Ex, 5th-Platoon Ex).

Unarmed Division

Just as in the Armed Division, a returning team built on their strong 1998 finish to grab the overall title. **Forest HS** snuck up on everyone and grabbed the Unarmed Challenge Level Championship. The **Wildcats** drill team from **Ocala, Florida** won with solid performances in all five team events, despite winning just three trophies (3rd-Flight Exhibition, 4th-Color Guard, 5th-Inspection). The gritty Air Force JROTC program was inspired by **C/Cdr Fritz** winning the Unarmed Commander's Trophy. Every point counted as the high flying drill team nudged away several tough competitors nipping at their heels.

Just missing the top spot was the always-impressive ladies from **Rahway HS**. The hard charging **Lady Devil Pups** from **Rahway, New Jersey** excelled within the basic side of the competition capturing 1st place in Inspection and Regulation, and garnering a 3rd place finish within Color Guard competition. Only a tough 13th place finish in Element Exhibition cost them the title. These Marines represented themselves and their service well, missing the overall Unarmed title by just 44 points out of 6,000!

Other strong Unarmed Division performances were found throughout the event, highlighted by: **Pine Ridge HS** (1st-Color Guard); **Denbigh HS** (1st-Flight Ex); **Forestville HS** (1st-Element Ex); **Winnsboro HS** (2nd-Inspection, 3rd-Regulation & Element Ex); **James F. Byrnes HS** (2nd-Flight Ex, 3rd-Inspection); **Jardines De Ponce HS** (2nd-Regulation, 5th-Flight Ex); **Rayville HS** (2nd-Element Ex, 4th-Flight Ex); and **Sandalwood HS** (2nd-Color Guard).

Open Level Color Guard

Strong teams with exceptional Color Guard units came together within the Open Level Color Guard. The judges were staggered by the level of excellence on display at this prestigious event. Blowing away the competition was first-time attendee **St. Cloud HS**. Their near flawless routine left the judges' jaws on the floor. The **Bulldogs** color guard from **St. Cloud, Florida** earned a record 1,166 out of 1,200 possible points!

Other top-finishing schools earning Open Level Color Guard trophies were spread across the United States. These trophy winners were:

- 2nd place: MacArthur HS - Irving, TX
- 3rd place: Florida Air Academy - Melbourne, FL
- 4th place: Westover HS - Fayetteville, NC
- 5th place: Rayville HS - Rayville, LA

Knockout Drills and a spirited Awards Ceremony were held immediately following the conclusion of the team competition. The lively Awards Ceremony gave recognition to the individuals and the schools who excelled and made the 1999 Challenge Level competition another huge success.

Williams H.S.** (3rd-Color Guard); **Springfield H.S.** (4th-Squad & Platoon Ex); **Lyman H.S.** (4th-Inspection, 5th-Regulation) and **Fern Creek H.S.** (4th-Regulation, 5th-Inspection).

Unarmed Division Highlights

Theodore Roosevelt H.S. from **San Antonio, Texas** continues to own the National Championship platform by capturing their eighth Unarmed Division National Championship in the last nine years. The **Riderettes** drill performance was an "extinction-level event" for their competitors, nailing 1st place finishes in every team event except Inspection (finished in 3rd place). The victory was an overpowering triumph under the eagle eye of SAI, **LTC Jerry Cheatom**.

The impressive **Queen's Guard** from **Winston Churchill H.S.** put together another great showing grabbing the National Runner-Up trophy in the Unarmed Division. The team was carried by strong Element Ex (2nd place) and Flight Ex (3rd place) finishes.

Other impressive performances included: **Boca Raton H.S.** (1st-Inspection, 3rd-Regulation); **Douglas MacArthur H.S.** (2nd-Inspection, 3rd-Element Ex, 4th-Color Guard & Flight Ex, 5th-Regulation); **T.C. Williams H.S.** (2nd-Regulation, 3rd-Color Guard and 4th-Inspection); **Walla Walla H.S.** (2nd-Flight Ex, 5th-Inspection) and **Pine Ridge H.S.** (2nd-Color Guard).

Alternative Arms Division Highlights

This division has become an ongoing battle ground, with the title ripe for the picking every year. Tight scoring in this division is routine with the Army JROTC unit at **Miami Coral Park H.S.** from **Miami, Florida** stepping up to capture the Alternative Arms National Championship by a scant 38 points out of 6,000. The **Hurricanes** drill team gained trophy status in every team event except Regulation Drill. With the program led by SAI, **Major Al Schmitt**, these hard-chargers were primed to put forth their finest effort in capturing their first National Championship title.

Long-time Nationals attendee and Florida powerhouse **Palm Bay H.S.** just missed the coveted overall title. The **Lady Pirates** Marine Corps drill team maintained a higher overall average finish than the division champions, with only a soft Squad Exhibition score killing their chance at the overall title.


